

OFFERS A CANAL WITHOUT COST

Gen. Reyes' Proposition to the Washington Governments Somewhat Surprising.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 28.—That the republic of Colombia grant to the United States all the canal concessions...

"My energies and those of my followers will be devoted to the granting of the canal concessions to the United States without the payment of a cent. Even at this Colombia will be the gainer. All Colombia is in favor of the canal...

When his attention was called to the reports from Panama and other sources that he is coming to Washington to lobby to defeat the ratification of the treaty, Gen. Reyes said emphatically:

"My movements here will be strictly in accordance with the news which I am clothed. I shall deal with the officials of the Washington government direct, to whom I bear letters of credence from the Bogota government. I am not here as a private agent and I shall ignore such reflections upon my personal and official character."

THEY FAVOR SEATTLE

Army Officials Believe in More Steamers to Manila.

Globe Special Washington Service, 1417 G Street, WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 28.—The war department officials would welcome the establishment of a first-class passenger service between Seattle and the Philippines. Only two large steamships are equipped to carry passengers between Seattle and Manila, and those have only just been fitted out for this service. Complaints have been made about the discrimination on the part of the war department between Seattle and San Francisco, and there has been ground for it. There has not been as much ground for it, however, as there would have been were it not for the fact that San Francisco is geographically in a better position to handle the passenger business.

One officer of the war department who has no prejudice in favor of San Francisco or against Seattle, so far as the government transportation business is concerned, is Col. Clarence Edwards, chief of the insular bureau. Col. Edwards said today that he would be highly pleased if it were possible to send passengers to the Philippines at convenient sailing dates from Seattle. It would sometimes be more convenient to send these passengers by the northern route, but there are no accommodations on most of the vessels sailing from Puget sound direct to Manila.

On the other hand, the war department is afforded three sailings every month by merchant ships from San Francisco. One of these monthly sailings is direct to Manila, and the other two are by way of Hongkong, with no extra charge for passengers carried for the war department to Manila. Many civil employees and other persons are carried at the expense of the government between the Pacific coast of the United States and the Philippines. The transportation of these persons is under the control of the quartermaster's department, but of the insular bureau. An extremely favorable rate has been obtained from the Southern Pacific railway and the Pacific Mail Steamship company, the rate applying to persons carried from widely scattered points in the United States. The rate has not been made known publicly. Col. Edwards would be glad to see the time come when passengers can be carried by way of Seattle at frequent intervals, for this would mean competition between transportation lines and possibly lower rates for the government. The number of persons transported to Manila under the auspices of the insular bureau averages sixty or seventy a month. —Walter E. Clark.
