## DOPING OF PATRICE ADMITTED BY OWNER

### Crescent City Club Stewards Now Endeavoring to Fix Responsibility.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 3.—Cardinal Walsey, Monastick and Ben Chan were the winning favorites at the Crescent City track this afternoon. All were heavily backed at short odds. The track was fast. Several stables are expected in from Benning tomorrow. The stewards have not concluded their investigation of the condition of the mare Patrice, which started in the sixth race on Wednesday. Enough has been learned, however, to warrant either the trainer or foreman of the stable being ruled off. That the mare was "doped" is admitted by her owner, and the only thing that remains before official action is taken is to place the responsibility on the proper parties. Summary:

## YALE MAY ARRANGE GAME WITH MICHIGAN

### Nothing Can Be Done Until the Blue Team Elects Its Captain.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 3.—Rumors that the University of Michigan is trying to arrange a football game with Yale for next season were current here yesterday. The Yale baseball head coach, Dr. Murray was coach of the Leland Stanford football team when Yost was out of ball coach there. They lunched with Walter Camp, the Yale athletic director, Yost left in the evening. He said: "My visit here is purely a social affair. I am not the person who arranges games for the Michigan university. I admit that I would like to see a Yale-Michigan game, but I did not come to New Haven to arrange it. I came East to go to my old home in West Virginia and see the army-navy football game."

After the talk between Coach Yost and Walter Camp neither would admit that anything definite regarding a Yale-Michigan game next year was discussed. Nothing can be done here relative to the alleged challenge of Michigan, advanced by Coach Yost, till a Yale captain is chosen for next season.

If the new captain wishes a Western game he will have the power to select one. Yale will play Harvard and Princeton as usual next year. In case Michigan is met Columbia would probably be dropped.

Foulke to Captain Tigers.

PRINCETON, N. J., Dec. 3.—Walter L. Foulke, of Germantown, Pa., today was elected captain of the Princeton football team. He has played right halfback on the varsity team for three years.

### Six National Committeemen Favor Beer City for 1905 Annual Gathering.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 3.—Milwaukee's chances of landing the 1905 convention of the American Bowling Congress appear brighter at present than ever before, and if the proper amount of work is done by the local bowlers they should land the prize easily when the bowlers meet at Cleveland in February.

Charles F. Moll, first vice president of the A. B. C., has received letters from six members of the executive committee, all of whom are in favor of holding the 1905 annual gathering in Milwaukee.

Another candidate for the convention is appeared in the field, the Pittsburg bowlers having decided to try to land the session. Detroit is also making a fight for it, while Louisville has dropped from the race and will pull for Milwaukee.

### RACE BOARD WOULD MAKE RECORDS UNIFORM

National Trotting Association Requests Conference With American Association.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—At a meeting of the board of review of the National Trotting association today a resolution was adopted declaring the power of the president to appoint a committee to request a conference with the American Trotting Registering association for the purpose of making records uniform. The conference will be held in New York Jan. 5, 1904.

The application of H. O. Davis, of Columbia, S. C., for the removal of himself and the mare Queen and bay stallion Manola from suspension imposed July, 1903, was granted.

The board considered the case of Hartford, superintendent of the Ashley stock farm, of Belleville, Ontario, against the Belleville Trotting association, limited, and the starters and judges at the August races. The association was ordered to pay the Ashley stock farm \$4,000, which it unlawfully retained from the winnings of Lady Hamlet, and was fined \$5 for allowing other persons than those named to start.

Jeremiah Murphy, of New York, asked for the removal of the expulsion order imposed on him by the Waverly, N. J., track association in 1897. Murphy said that since this expulsion he had raced horses under assumed names and claimed that Barney Demarest had driven the horses. No decision was reached, but a case was ordered brought against Demarest.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 3.—Arthur Hale Curtis will be coach for the Wisconsin football team again next season. At a meeting of the athletic board of directors today a committee was appointed to arrange with Curtis for coaching. Capt. Abbott submitted the names of men who had served the official during the football season and it was ratified. Remp, Wrebel, Baine, Robinson, Washer, Scott, Peterson, Clark and Jones received the "W's." A salary of \$300 was voted to Earl Driver as coach in turning out the championship freshman team.
