M'CUMBER OPPOSES THE CUBAN BILL

Says We Have Already Discharged All Our Duties to the Island. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 15.—The senate continued the debate on the Cuban bill today. Mr. Perkins (Cal.) spoke for the measure as did Mr. Simmons (N. C.). Mr. McCumber (N. D.) opposed it. Mr. Patterson (Col.) made an extended speech against the bill, during which there were numerous colloquies between himself, Mr. Aldrich and Mr. Dooliver. With the former there was quite a lively debate on the tariff, in which Mr. Aldrich said the duty on sugar was too high. Mr. Dooliver replied to suggestions made by Mr. Patterson that Gov. Cummins, of Iowa, had changed his tariff views after having visited the White house. Others were engaged in the debate at the close of the session. Mr. McCumber ridiculed the statements of friends of the measure that its passage was the payment of a debt and said such expressions were mistaken ideas of philanthropy. On the contrary, Cuba for years had tugged at the tether which bound her to Spanish aggression and when we cut those bonds it was not understood that we should bear the expense of making the Cubans prosperous and happy. Beyond applying to Cuba the protection of the Monroe doctrine, guarding her against external dangers from foreign countries and possibly internal anarchy, he said, we have no duty toward the island that has not been already discharged.

GARDNER REPLIES TO JOHN LIND

Massachusetts Republican has No Use for Reciprocity. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 15.—Rural free delivery, reciprocity with Canada and the new republic of Panama were topics of discussion in the house today. The subject of rural free delivery was introduced by Mr. Maddox (Dem., Ga.), who claimed that certain states had been favored in the establishment of this service. A vigorous reply was introduced by Mr. Gardner (Rep., Ind.) among others replied on the Republican side. Mr. Crumpacker (Rep., Pa.) defended the course pursued by the administration in dealing with the Central American situation and replied to criticisms which have been made on the opposite side of the chamber. Mr. Gardner (Rep., Mass.) replied to the remarks of Mr. Lind (Dem., Minn.) relative to free trade relations with Canada. He said the protection of this country would suffer if thrown into competition with labor in Quebec.
