

CHARGES AGAINST SANCHO PANZA

Senator Morgan Sharply Scores the Roosevelt Panama Policy.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 4.—The senate's first session following the holiday recess was devoted entirely to Panama. President Roosevelt sent a message on the subject. Discussion continued throughout the day, speeches being made both in defense and in opposition to the policy that has been pursued.

Threatens National Integrity.

As for himself he was not opposing the president's policy, he said, but because he believed the course of the president to be such as to threaten the integrity of the United States. He argued that the precedents set by the fact government of Panama has no right to transfer territory, but he declared that the president knew that only by his recognition of Panama could he acquire a concession there.

How Did Bunua-Varilla Know? Mr. Morgan had an article read from a Paris paper, printed last September, and of which Mr. Morgan said Minister Bunua-Varilla was the author.

He predicted that even though the government of the United States should undertake the construction of the Panama canal, a canal would be first built over Nicaragua, not because of its superior feasibility.

Won't Be Used As a Pawn. "If there are Democrats who think that the best way to defeat the Republicans is to follow their lead," he said, "I must see to it that I obtain an obstinate man of one idea or driven into commercial practices in politics or into political gambling with the laws, as pawns on the chess board, to be moved back and forth at the will of the player with the use of the army and navy, in unlawful way, to give spectacular effect to the leader of a campaign for the presidency."

The Rev. Dr. Everett Hale, the newly elected chaplain of the senate, occupied the chair of the presiding officer, just preceding the session, and on the body being called to order offered a stirring invocation. His prayer was a plea for the wisdom of heaven in the affairs of the government.

Investigation Sought in the House. A privileged resolution offered in the house by Mr. Hay (Dem., Va.) recited that certain statements contained in the Bristol postoffice investigation report reflected upon members of the house. They referred chiefly to alleged contracts with members for rental of postoffice premises. It provided for an investigation by a committee to be appointed by the speaker.

A point of order made against the resolution by Mr. Gardner (Rep.) was overruled and the same fate met Mr. Payne (Rep.), who desired to refer the resolution to the postoffice committee. A vote on ordering the previous question resulted in a tie, the minority supporting Mr. Hay. The vote devolved on a quorum, and the house adjourned.
