FASHIONS FROM VOGUE

Bridge has become such an important factor in the life of the average society woman, that dresses are now being especially designed for this purpose, and while they are not yet called bridge gowns, it will probably be only a short time before they will be thus designated.

Very elaborate afternoon gowns are usually worn, though sometimes a dainty lace waist will be worn with a handsome tailor-made suit. The former style of dress is more appropriate, for the players remain indoors for such a length of time that a house gown seems more suitable than a street costume.

The smart frock illustrated would be charming for such an occasion, or for a day "at home." It is made of light gray panne crepe de chine, which is a new variety of this lovely material, and is trimmed with taffeta of a lighter tone of gray.

The foundation skirt is finished with a deep platted founce with three quillings of the silk at the bottom, and the crepe skirt, which is made with a circular upper part and wide shaped founce, is finely tucked on the sides, as is shown by the cut. The flounce is likewise tucked vertically at the top and is finished with horizontal tucks at the lower edge, and is headed by a silver braid with white lace medallions inset at intervals. These medallions are particularly pretty, for they are lined with light blue silk covered with black chiffon, which produces a lovely effect.

The bodice is made with a yoke and vest of gray silk veiled first with blue and then with gray chiffon, and over this is a lattice of the silver braid, to which are attached little bell-shaped dangling ornaments of black and silver silk. A wide ruffle of point de Venise lace edges the yoke and across the front and on either shoulder are applied lace medallions lined with blue and black like those used on the skirt.

The flaring bell sleeves are of crepe, beneath which is a full ruffle of lace and deep cuffs corresponding to the yoke. The folded belt is of blue panne velvet.
