POTTS BROTHERS WIN TWO FIGHTS

Local Sports See Four Fast Boxing Bout at A. A. Club Rooms.

Jimmie Potts and his brother, "Kid Selby," both of Minneapolis, were the particular stars of the boxing card put on by the Amateur Athletic association at its club rooms on Sixth street last night. Potts, on the principal event of the evening, had no trouble in handling Walter Campbell, and his brother was given the decision over Andrew Martinelli by Referee Murphy, who stopped this bout in the third round. "Pat Ebbs" and "Kid" Banholzer opened the entertainment with a fast three-round bout. The two went to a draw and the go was one of the best of the evening. Several times Ebbs landed straight punches that staggered the Kid, but Banholzer always came back and using a vicious left hand won his right to a draw. McFarland and Matthews, two colored fighters, furnished the second preliminary, which was scheduled for six rounds. At the start of the clash Potts landed hard on Campbell's left eye and raised a blue eye, but almost closed the optic. This rather discouraged Campbell and he spent the major portion of the remaining time working his fighting face and attempting to dodge Potts' jabs and swings. His tactics disappointed the crowd, which impatiently demanded that he mix it up with the Minneapolis man, and in justice to Campbell, it must be said that he had mapped out his method of fighting before the bout and was following out his system. As he expected, Potts' eye was playing to get Potts tired. He explained this for four rounds and at the end of the fifth minute of the sixth round, Potts failed to mix it up by reporting that he had tired himself. The sixth round furnished the only fast work of the night. This time Potts insisted upon satisfying the crowd and went at Campbell with a rush that was fast for the tired but not for the fit. Campbell saved himself as much as possible by hanging on, but there was no profit in this. When the gong awarded the decision to Potts.

NEW EDWARDS TRIAL TALK CROP REPORTS

Grain Men to Face Other National Board of Trade Men Charges Next Monday. Discuss Their Collection. Special to The Globe. WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 19.—The National Board of Trade met here today for its thirty-fourth annual session with delegates present representing thirty-five commercial organizations out of a total membership of forty-seven bodies. The annual address of the president, Mr. Randall, of Baltimore, and the reports of the several officers showed substantial progress during the past year. The principal matter of interest which came up was the report submitted by E. B. Murray, chairman of the committee on crop statistics, who discussed the standing recommendation that government reports be collected either by the census bureau or the department of agriculture alone. The opinion seemed to prevail that the bureau of statistics of the agricultural department is the better prepared to do the work.
