

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GOV. TAFT IS SANGUINE AS TO FUTURE OF PHILIPPINES

New Secretary of War Reaches San Francisco En Route for Washington—He Puts in a Good Word for the Mikado and Tells of the Development of the Philippines.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 23.—Gov. W. H. Taft, who arrived here from the Philippines on his way to Washington to assume the secretaryship of war, said he hoped the Russo-Japanese crisis might yet be bridged over and peace preserved.

Mr. Taft said the welcome given himself and wife by the mikado was flattering in the extreme. The host expressed his warm sympathy for the United States and the friendly relations he hoped would ever prevail between Japan and the United States.

Mr. Taft said that conditions in the Philippines were better than ever before and he doubted if greater tranquillity ever prevailed.

"We are now looking forward," he said, "to a period of great activity in railroad building throughout the islands. English and Belgian capitalists have so far controlled the field, but the people of the islands are anxious for the introduction of American capital, which so far has not been forthcoming.

Asked if the Philippines were in a condition to govern themselves, Gov. Taft said they certainly were not at present, and to make a prediction on the subject would be looking too far into the future.

"I admit that the head of the church claims to receive divine revelations.
