Veteran Wisconsin Trainer and Kilpatrick May Be Asked to Resign.

BEDE HYPNOTIZES CONGRESS AND WINS SPURS

Mr. Bede appealed to that party to disband and extended it an invitation to join the Republican ranks and accept the election of Roosevelt unanimously.

BOGUS STATUE OF NELSON TURNS UP

LONDON, Jan. 28.—A sensation has been caused in art circles at the discovery that a silver statuette of Nelson, supposed to have been presented to the hero by George III, and which was purchased recently for \$2,000 by public subscription, was a bogus. The statuette was the work of a young sculptor student named Richard Garbe, and was executed two years ago. Garbe is quite blameless for this forging of his work on the public.

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JIMMY RYAN SLATED FOR DALE GEAR'S JOB

Former Manager of St. Paul Team to Direct Tebeau's No. 2 Team.

Special to The Globe. CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—If present indications are correct, many baseball stars will win their fame on local diamonds next season. It has practically been decided that Charles Dexter, a great favorite at one time with the West side fans, will take the management of George Tebeau's Louisville team in the spring. Herman Long has been chosen to lead the Toledo team, also of the American association, and the latest rumor is that Jimmy Ryan, the former captain of the West side team for a number of years, is about to sign as manager of the Kansas City team of the Western association. Probably outside of sport, Ryan, who has won greater fame on the local diamond than Jimmy Ryan, Ryan has been with the Washington club of the American league for the past two years, and although his release has not been announced, it is generally understood that he will not be retained. George Tebeau, who also owns the Kansas City club of the association, has been in the city for a number of days and together with other businessmen is looking out for the welfare of his minor league clubs for the coming season.

ERRING CASHIER MAKES CONFESSION

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 28.—George A. Rose, the alleged defaulting cashier of the Produce Exchange bank, which closed Jan. 22, made a confession this evening to the county prosecutor, telling of his method of using the bank's money, of which he is said to have lost \$187,000. Rose said that he was alone in his speculation and that his use of the bank's money began about six years ago. He said that about two years ago, when the loss had reached only \$20,000, an auditing committee was appointed to go over the bank's books. Rose had hoped that his confession this evening would be a confession that would be discovered then, but the committee reported everything satisfactory. Rose declares that he lived within his salary of \$125 a month. When the shortage had reached \$200,000, Rose said he knew that he would have to replace that sum, and seeing no other way of doing it than by speculation, he continued to do so until the amount reached \$187,000.

GIVES GUIDANCE TO OCEAN TRAVELERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 28.—Secretary Shaw has issued a circular to passengers arriving in the United States from foreign countries regarding examinations of baggage, passengers' declarations, exemptions from duty, etc., which will be sent to each passenger as far as possible before embarking on outgoing steamers. As to following a recent decision of the circuit court of appeals for the Second circuit, holding in effect that each returning passenger, a resident of the United States, may bring into the country free of duty a certain amount of baggage, except cigars and cigarettes in excess of fifty of the former and 300 of the latter, for himself or any other person up to the amount of \$100, provided they are not intended for sale.
