ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 20.-The czar, according to those who have ac closed to civilians. The correspondent says:

Diplomats Say She Can End the Mace donian Trouble for All Time.

PARIS, Feb. 20.-Almost with as close attention as they are giving the Russian-Japanese war, the French au-thorities are watching events in the thorities are watching events in the Balkans. From Bulgaria assurances have been received that she does not propose to take any measures to precipitate war, and most of the leaders of the recent insurrection have indicated their purpose to see what the reforms will accomplish before renewing the rebellion in Macedonia. Moreover, it is not believed here that the facedonian committee has as much money donian committee has as much money as heretofore with which to carry on a conflict.

COSSACKS WILL WEAR TERRIFYING HEADGEAR

Denial That Russian Soldiers Suffer or Railway Trains.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 20 .- Military activity is proceeding on an ever-increasing scale and all is in readiness for the mobilization of the entire Russian army should that become necessary. In a fortnight 100,000 additional troops will be in Manchuria. Three army corps of Siberian rifles have al-ready been organized and a fourth soon will be completed. There is also a brigade of Cossack artillery, armed with excellent mountain guns.

Although the Japanese seem to be making Port Arthur one of their main objectives, military men here do not believe that they will be able to effect and hold a landing there. The entire and hold a landing there. The entire country is strongly held by a division of Cossacks, which was moved out to the far East from the Caucasus some time ago. Other Cossack regiments are under orders to join their comrades. The Russian army will have a distinctly Cossack appearance. Enormous shakes of black, long-haired sheepskin will be worn by the officers sheepskin will be worn by the officers and men of the fighting regiments. This headgear is known as "papaha," and is practical in keeping the head and neck warm and the bleak Manchurian winds from the eyes and ears.

DANGEROUS NAVAL PRECEDENT PERHAPS

France May Have Liberated Chickens That Will Come Home.

PARIS, Feb. 20.—Exchanges of communications of a friendly character have occurred between France and Japan with respect to the stay of the Russian squadron at Jibutil, French Somalliand. France did not hesitate to make a complete explanation of her reason for not ordering the Russian ships to depart and it is said that this ships to depart and it is said that this explanation was thoroughly satisfactory to the Japanese. The fairness with which the French government dealt with the question was gratifying to the Japanese representatives and is asserted that there is no reason to believe that any friction will arise between the countries regarding the in-

cident.

It is now stated that France's neutrality instructions, while specifying the limit of stay to ships of war, differ from the English neutrality laws, in that this provision is covered with various provisions, which allow changes in the time of stay during which war vessels of belligerents may be in French ports. France has not ordered the Russian ships to leave Jibutil. This would have aroused the French people. would have aroused the French peo-ple, whose sympathies with Russia are exceedingly keen, and this Japan and her ally do not desire.

SPAIN MOBILIZES BECAUSE FRIGHTENED

RURAL CARRIERS WILL GET HIGHER PAY

Minnesota Delegation Decides Upon the Course to Pursue.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 20.— Members of the Minnesota delegation get together informally today to decide what to do about that provision in the postoffice appropriation bill dealing with the salaries of rural free delivery carriers. It was decided that it would be best to support the recit would be best to support the rec-ommendations of the committee, which provide for an increase of salaries of carriers to \$720 a year, but providing also that carriers shall not be permit-ted to continue to act as express agents and circulation agents for newspapers.—Walter E. Clark.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 20 .- The house committee today completed the postoffice appropriation bill, which carries \$169,997,588. The appropriation carries \$169,997,588. The appropriation last year was \$153,500,000. The committee first cut the estimate to the extent of \$3,256,000 and then added \$5,180,000 caused by a provision increasing from \$600 to \$720 the salaries of rural free delivery carriers. The total appropriation for rural free delivery service is \$21,000,000. Last year this item was \$12,600,000.

The fast mall subsidies, amounting to \$142,000, between Washington and New Orleans, and \$25,000 between Kansas City and Newton, Kan., are continued. The item for railway transportation amounts to \$45,000,000, which is an increase of about 3 per cent.
