Intended Using Wives and Children of Penitentiary Guards as Shields.

SANTA FE, N. M., Feb. 22--Seven life convicts at the New Mexico penitentiary today overpowered Acting Superintendent R. C. Garrett and cut him with a knife, because he would not give up the combination to the armory. They were subdued by the guards before they could accomplish their apparent purpose to seize the death of my beloved husband, Schurer Werner, M. Anna Werner, St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 22, 1904.

Philippine Commerce Increases.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 22--The development of the Philippine commerce and industry for the nine months of 1903, is the subject of a special bulletin by the bureau of insular affairs. It is shown that both in exports and imports there was an increase compared with a corresponding period in the preceding year. Heavy exports of hemp and copra, offsetting heavy imports of rice, explained the increase. During the period named the exports were \$26,103,601 against \$24,328,323 for 1902.

The exports amounted to \$23,563,328 an increase of nearly 500,000. The rice imports were the only ones that increased and there was a falling off in general trade, the United States losing 10 per cent and the United Kingdom 16 per cent, while Spain has only two-thirds of the amount of her trade in 1902.

United States exports increased from \$7,232,411 to \$9,136,025 and the trade with Spain was practically the same. But a small part of the United States business is carried under the American flag and all but 5 per cent of the general trade of the islands is done in foreign bottoms.

Coldest for Fifty Years. ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Feb. 22--The worst cold wave for fifty years was experienced in Newfoundland yesterday, when accompanied by a furious gale, the temperature dropped to 25 to 45 degrees below zero. The whole of the seaboard is frozen. The intensity of the weather causes the belief to prevail that the Arctic ice floes will be impassable to the sealing steamers which will start on their annual cruise next month.
