MAY SCUTTLE GUNBOAT AT NEW-CHWANG.

TIENTSIN, March 10.—The Russians at New-chwang are prepared, in order to block the river, to scuttle the gunboat Sivouch, in the event of a Japanese advance on that town.

TROOPS POURING INTO KOREA.

LONDON, March 11.—A Nagasaki correspondent of the Express asserts that 200,000 troops have been shipped from Japan, and that a portion of the Second army corps is now on its way to Korea.

A correspondent of the Chronicle at Kinchow mentions Funghwang (forty-five miles northwest of Antung, in Manchuria) as one of several points of Russian concentration.

TWO JAP ARMIES GOING NORTH.

A Shanghai correspondent of the Telegraph says that the Japanese, after Port Arthur is neutralized, probably will move two armies to the north simultaneously.

According to a Tien Tsin correspondent of the Standard, the Russians are withdrawing all their superfluous troops from Port Arthur to Harbin and Kirin because of the shortness of provisions.

WOMEN SAID TO BE IMPLICATED.

PARIS, March 11.—In spite of official reticence and denials from the Japanese legation, it is again affirmed that a non-commissioned officer named Martin, who was employed in the ministry of marine, and who is now under arrest, attempted to sell French naval secrets to a naval attaché at the Japanese legation.

The discovery came as a result of the accidental opening of a letter addressed to Martin by a naval captain of the same. This letter was from an intermediary, but it indicated the principals in the affair.

It is said that the documents accessible to Martin related to the possibility of joint naval action by France and Russia.

MOUNTED SCOUTS COLLIDE.

TOKYO, March 10.—Russian and Japanese mounted scouts met north of Ping-yang yesterday. After a brief engagement the Russians retreated. No casualties are reported on either side.

WHEN ROSEN BADE FAREWELL TO TOKYO

Russian Minister Was Carefully Protected on His Departure.

TOKYO, Japan, Feb. 11.—The pall of solemn secrecy that has been hanging over the Japanese capital for more than a month was lifted yesterday.

The staid dropped their masks and revealed themselves as human beings with human emotions, subject to human excitement. They came out of their shells and gathered in the streets and talked and laughed and cheered and acted just as any other people would who had received news of a great naval victory over a powerful enemy.

The people celebrated the first naval victory at Port Arthur with unbounded enthusiasm. During the demonstration the Russian legation, which is close to the navy department, was dark. There was no sign of a demonstration there.

It was not until Baron Rosen and his establishment left Tokyo this evening that anything like discourtesy was attempted, and then it was sharply repressed.

WILL NOT FOLLOW THE RUSSIANS NORTH

Japs Say They Will Remain at Port Arthur After Taking It.

VICTORIA, B. C., March 10.—The Northern Pacific liner Olympia arrived from Yokohama today. Among her passengers was Capt. Hill, who took the Japanese cruiser Nishin from Genoa to Yokohama.

Capt. Hill was told by Japanese admirals that the main object of the Japanese operations at present was Port Arthur. They want to capture that place at any cost.

Russia Warns China. ST. PETERSBURG, March 10.—Russia has served notice on China that the latter must not send troops beyond the great wall, and that she must exercise her influence to restrain the Chinese agents, who are operating under the control of Chinese officers, from interfering with the railroad and telegraph lines.

ROSEBERY SCORES PREMIER BALFOUR

House of Lords Hears Speech of Vim and Is Naturally Astounded.

LONDON, March 10.—An extraordinary scene disturbed the house of lords this evening.

In a recent debate in the house of commons Premier Balfour had used the word "calumnium" with reference to some statement made by Lord Rosebery in the fiscal controversy.

Lord Rosebery asked Lord Lansdowne, the former secretary, what justification existed for the premier's use of such a word.

Lord Lansdowne explained the circumstances, which concerned the alleged presentation of two documents by Premier Balfour to the cabinet on the fiscal question and the subsequent withdrawal of them.

DES MOINES, Iowa, March 10.—Gov. Channing today sent to the legislature a message in which he called attention to the fact that under the present laws of Iowa it is impossible to extradite a person charged with murder by sending poisoned candy through the mails, as in the case of Mrs. Sherman Dye, of Boone, who has been released.

He urged the legislature to remedy the omission and make it possible for the governor to honor a requisition from another state for a person who is not a fugitive from justice.

Attorney General Mullan, with the judiciary committee of the assembly, is trying to draft such a law.
