PUPILS WIN HONOR

Central High Has Many Studious Attendants.

Before an assembly of the whole school Dr. Robinson, principal of the Central high school, announced the honor roll of the senior class. This year's class is the largest in the history of the school, having 170 members, as against 150 for last year's, which was a record-breaker. Although the highest mark was two points lower than last year, the general average was much higher, as last year there were only twenty-seven students who had more than 84.5 for a final average, while this year there were forty-seven. About one-third (fifty-eight) of this year's class are boys, and of the fifteen students who have an average of 90 or over for their entire course there are nine girls and six boys. Of the twenty-seven on the honor roll, nine, or just one-third, are boys.

Miss Emily Schons, who had an average of 94.85, will be valedictorian of the class. Anna Doyle will give the salutatory address. The other members of the honor roll will be: Mary E. Baugh and a faculty committee will choose the best six, which will be given at the commencement exercises of the class.

BOARD OF CONTROL STILL KEEPS MUM

Refuses to Discuss Charges Against Warden Welfer Preferred by W. B. Jordan.

The members of the board of control remain firmly entrenched behind the shadow of their own official dignity and refuse to discuss the Welfer incident with any but their closest personal and political friends. While The Globe has published statements from W. B. Jordan wholly sufficient in the eyes of the unprejudiced to warrant the closest investigation by the board of control or those who have authority over the prison management, yet the board of control persists in its declaration that there is nothing to investigate.

At the state capitol yesterday afternoon none of the members of the board appeared but Judge Gould, and he had nothing to say on the subject. The Globe's expose of the fallacy of the board of control's position that it had no charges before it, by publishing a copy of the transcript of the proceedings before the board as early as March 2 and while Mr. Jordan had made almost identically the same charges which he made through the columns of The Globe on March 11, showed to the public that the board had been unwilling to take the public into its confidence and cemented the belief that the board was doing its best to belittle the demand from the public for a thorough investigation of the whole matter. Said a leading Republican official yesterday:

While I am not looking for any quarrel with the board of control, it is my honest belief that the interests of the state administration demand the fullest and fairest inquiry into the whole facts connected with the so-called Welfer incident and the shoe contract. The board of control naturally hesitates before undertaking anything that will reflect on anybody under its authority, but the facts should be shown, and the man who should be punished, Jordan's statements are so serious a charge that the board should not be accepted without additional investigation by the board.

GOOD SEATS FOR ELKS SHOW STILL ON HAND

Tickets Have Been Kept Out of the Hands of Speculators.

The timely warning issued by the Elks' national committee against patronizing scalpers was effective, and, as a consequence, there are just as good seats to be had as have been sold. The impression that the scalpers had bought up the house again will be agreeably surprised at this information, as many erstwhile patrons of the Elks' show had become so disgusted at having to pay a premium for seats, that they had forewarned the pleasure of witnessing this year's production. The committee has lent its every effort to the effect that scalping would be prohibited, and that it has been successful is evidenced by the fact that the best seats are still obtainable.

MANY WATER PIPES MUST BE THAWED OUT

Secretary Caulfield Says They Will Be Put Deeper in the Ground.

"The condition of the service pipes of the water works of St. Paul show but little improvement," said Secretary John Caulfield, of the water department yesterday. "Five new complaints were received yesterday, and what we have thawed out hundreds of service pipes since the very cold weather, there are still plenty needing attention. On the West side there are six-inch water pipes that are frozen for a distance of a block and must be dug up and thawed out. "Judging from our past experience, there is little hope of relief before the middle of April, so far as the water is concerned. This means that all the pipes must be uncovered and thawed out. In all such cases the pipes are put deeper in the ground for the future. This has been by far the worst winter in the history of the water department."

QUESTIONS RIGHT TO INSTRUCT.

RESOLUTIONS CAUSE TROUBLE.

Then the resolutions proved a subject for some objection. Dar F. Reese offered the resolutions, and he admitted they were written by United States Marshal W. H. Grimshaw, of Minneapolis. The resolutions were so worded that they were general in scope, and they lost nothing in the reading. Reese's sonorous voice played with the adjectives employed by the writer until every one was laughing when he should have been howling with enthusiasm for Roosevelt, whom the resolutions put on a pedestal, and the delegates to the district convention were instructed in iron-clad terms, to vote for him.
