MOBILIZING THIRD ARMY

PARIS, March 17.—The Tokyo correspondent of the Matin sends this information, which he says comes from reliable authority, concerning the Japanese military situation up to March 10:

ARE THEY CROSSING THE YALU?

LONDON, March 17.—Much interest is manifested in the report that the Russian main advance is crossing the Yalu, but this is not yet confirmed, and, according to the Chronicle's Ping-yang correspondent, all the Russian troops have left North Korea, 20,000 of them being concentrated at Kulion Cheng, north of the Yalu river, in Manchuria.

SEE SEVEN RUSSIAN SHIPS

TOKYO, March 16.—Tokyo is unadvised regarding the naval plans and movements of the Russians, and is in doubt whether the remnant of their fleet is still at Port Arthur or is en route to Vladivostok.
