LABOR'S SIDE HEARD Gompers and Others Favor Anti-Injunction Bill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 23.—The house committee on judiciary today listened to arguments in favor of the anti-injunction bill. H. R. Fuller, representing the Railway Trainmen's organization; Andrew Furuseth, representing the American Seamen's union, and President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, were heard, and the hearings ended with his testimony. Mr. Fuller declared the opponents of the bill had acknowledged that they were practically in favor of government by injunction, which would abolish trial by jury and all the rights that labor holds sacred. If the bill were unconstitutional, as its opponents have claimed, then an amendment should be made to the constitution. Mr. Fuller severely criticized several judges who have issued injunctions against laborers on strike. Mr. Furuseth said that the opponents of the bill held that the product of labor was a property right. This right had been admitted in every injunction that had been issued against labor, but it was an entirely erroneous assumption. Pursued in its logical conclusion, it meant that the laborer was the property right of the capitalist. Mr. Gompers challenged many of the statements of opponents of the measure. James M. Beck, who had opposed the bill, he said, in his hearing before the committee, had quoted him (Gompers) as saying: "I believe if I was exercising my right as a citizen of this country I was enjoined by that court's injunction, I would not obey that injunction."

Mr. Gompers declared: "I resent that statement most emphatically." Speaking of the extent to which labor is organized, Mr. Gompers said: "I agree that we do not represent a majority of the workmen of the country, but I venture to say that we represent the most intelligent, the most skillful and the most manly of the workmen of the country, and this, too, without any reflection upon the non-union men." Mr. Gompers expressed the belief that the anti-injunction bill would be reported from the committee and pass the house and senate at the present session.

MILLS Wait on Railroads. SEATTLE, Wash., March 23.—One hundred and fifty-seven mills in the Northwestern states have been shut down to await the decision of the transcontinental railroads on the petition for a 40-cent lumber rate into Missouri river territory.
