HITS FRANCE OVER GERMANY'S SHOULDERS

Vatican Organ Extols Emperor William and His Country.
NAPLES, March 27.-The Observatore Romano, the organ of the Vatican, has a pious note to the emperor of Germany which is supposed to be inspired by the pope. The paper, in praising the emperor, says: "The impressive attitude of the monarch is his highest glory. It is a program which personifies the best form of modern civilization and shows it to be a modern, progressive nation, unnecessary to drive out the barbarians, to violently silence the bishops and to tire a whole people with an unwonted, uncomprehended struggle."

FRENCH GOVERNMENT PROTESTS TO VATICAN

Claim is Made That the Pope Failed to Abide by the Concordat.
PARIS, March 27.-The status of the Combes ministry and the passage of the law suppressing the teaching orders continue to absorb the attention of parliament. The ministerial issue has been brought to the fore Tuesday, when Marthe Minister Pelletan's administration of naval affairs will be considered, but it is now believed that the ministry will remain intact for the present.

IRRITATION PENDS

Hope of Reciprocity May Be Delayed by Canada.
Globe Special Washington Service, 1417 G Street.
WASHINGTON, D. C., March 27.-The state department today received a telegram from Consul General Foster, at Ottawa, in reply to its inquiry regarding private advices that the Canadian government had passed an order denying putting in force a coasting law in Canada similar to that of the United States. American transportation companies on the Pacific coast are up in arms against the reported order, for it will seriously affect the transportation of goods between Vancouver and Alaska, by way of the Yukon river. Consul General Foster's reply was: "The commissioner of customs stated yesterday that the newspaper report regarding American vessels at Vancouver was incorrect. The regulation of Jan. 23, 1903, required transportation in Canadian vessels, but this regulation was subsequently waived for 1903. It has not yet been waived for 1904, but may be later."

FILIPINOS FIND CLOTHING BURDENSOME

Burlington Railroad Officials Are Kept Busy by Savage Tribesmen.
ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 27.-Three hundred members of the savage tribes of the Philippine islands have arrived here and have been placed in that section of the city known as the Cuartel de Filipino. They arrived from Tacoma over the Burlington road and gave the officials of the road considerable concern by the manner in which they divested themselves of clothing.

NO LOVE FOR GOVERNMENT DREDGES

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 27.-A committee from the Lake Carriers' association appeared before Secretary Taft at the war department today to protest against the use of government dredges in the improvement of Lake Michigan and the waterways in the Michigan region as an infringement on the rights of private dredge companies. Gen. McKenzie, chief of engineers, was called into the conference. The secretary stated he would take the matter under consideration.

DIES ALONE IN ST. LOUIS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 27.-A stylishly dressed woman, about thirty-five years of age, was found dead tonight in a boarding house on Lindell boulevard, where she had been living for a week under the name of Miss Clara Bell. Her body was taken to the morgue, where it was identified as Miss Clara Bell, widow of Oshkosh, Wis. It is believed she died from heart disease.
