

MAKES A BAD BREAK

Roosevelt Approved Shaw's Attack Upon Cleveland.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—President Roosevelt caused it to be given out some time ago that he will make no public engagements for the coming summer, but that he will devote his time entirely to official business, with the exception of such recreation as he may take at his summer home at Oyster Bay. Within a few days it has been also given out that the president will not even attend the St. Louis exposition. It is a notorious fact that Mr. Roosevelt is head over heels in politics, and that the political game in connection with the Republican presidential nomination is being played for all it is worth.

The fact is that the president will take a very active, although apparently unobtrusive part in the coming campaign. The New York newspaper which suggested some time ago that President Roosevelt should act as his own campaign manager in the capacity of chairman of the Republican national committee was not so far out of the way as it might have been. He would not, of course, be the chairman, but everybody believes that he will be the de facto chairman—that is, he will in effect manage the campaign for himself.

One recent political move of the president has made a thoroughly bad impression, even among his friends. This was the speech of Secretary of the Treasury Shaw at Providence, in which he bitterly attacked and ridiculed Grover Cleveland. This speech was the cheapest kind of stump oratory, and it was an attack on an ex-president of the United States who is probably more widely respected today than he has ever been. That speech of the secretary was submitted to President Roosevelt before it was delivered, and he approved it.

LONE LAWYER HITS THE CANAL TREATY

Warren B. Wilson Files a Bill in Equity for an Injunction.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—Warren B. Wilson, a lawyer of Chicago, today filed in the district court a bill of equity for an injunction against Secretary Shaw, the republic of Panama, the new Panama Canal company of France and others to stop the construction of the Panama canal. He asks that Secretary Shaw be enjoined from permitting the payment from any moneys under his control under the pretended authority of the void act of June 28, 1902, entitled "an act to provide for the construction of a canal connecting the waters of the Atlantic and Pacific oceans." He avers that there is no appropriation by law of any money for the payment of any of the construction expenses and declares that the act of June 28, 1902, is in violation of the constitution and is null and void. He charges that the treaty is wholly unconstitutional and invalid.

Mr. Wilson tonight said that he represented no person or persons whatever except himself; that the question appealed to him personally and he proposed to fight the case along to the United States supreme court, which was the only tribunal that could pass finally on so important a matter. He announced that he would write to the attorney general asking his cooperation and said he hoped to satisfy the attorney general that the proceedings were in no wise frivolous. He claimed that the construction of the canal on alien territory violated the federal constitution.

Could Stand Strain No Longer.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—Charles G. Forster, a clerk employed in the White house office, shot and killed his wife and himself in Kensington, Md. Forster was a brother of Rudolph Forster, one of the assistant secretaries to President Roosevelt. Formerly a sailor, he had been employed in the White house office as a clerk for about four years. For a considerable time he had shown evidences of despondency, due, his friends say, partly to the illness of his wife and partly to financial troubles.

CAMP DOUGLAS IS TOO REMOTE, HE THINKS

Gen. Chaffee Opposes Purchase of Sites for Maneuvers Just Now.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—Secretary Taft has forwarded to the senate military committee with his approval a letter written by Gen. Chaffee, chief of staff, in opposition to the bill providing for the purchase of camp sites for military maneuvers at Cone-wago Valley, Pa.; Camp Douglas, Wis.; the Henry ranch in California, and Fort Sam Houston, Tex.

Gen. Chaffee favors the general scheme of large maneuvering camps, but does not consider it wise to select them arbitrarily at this time. He suggests that an appropriation of \$2,000,000 be made for such camps and that their selection be left to the decision of the war department after further investigation. The site in Wisconsin is opposed on the ground of its remoteness.

MAY NOW DEVOTE ALL HIS TIME TO MINING

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—The postmaster general today accepted the resignation of H. H. Rand as assistant superintendent of the department of salaries and allowances of the postoffice department. During the post-office inquiry it was charged that Rand was interested in the promotion of numerous speculative enterprises, mostly mining companies, and that he used his official position to induce departmental employees to buy stocks.
