FAIR COMMISSION MUST PAY THE BILL

Game Commission Refuses to Spend Money on Its St. Louis Exhibit.

The state game and fish commission will be glad indeed to assist the Minnesota commission to the St. Louis exposition with anything in its possession but money. The game preservers will loan the show people fish fry, mounted animals or stuffed birds, but it is the fact that the commission will not ask for anything that costs money to produce or to display.

At a meeting held at the state capital yesterday the game and fish commissioners adopted a resolution endorsing the work of the St. Louis commission and offering to extend it any courtesy, but declining it impossible to expend any money from its own funds to assist the fair commission in making an exhibit of game and fish at St. Louis.

The game commission yesterday went over the plans prepared for the new hatchery to be built at Glenwood this season. Plans prepared by E. S. Radcliffe, an architect of Duluth, call for the best hatchery in the United States. The commission's appropriation for the purpose is \$20,000, and \$3,000 had already been spent for a site at Glenwood.

BUSSES FOR PUPILS

Parker's Prairie May Adopt Consolidated School System.

Township officers of Parker's Prairie, Otter Tail county, will attempt to put into practice the township school plan now in force in some four or five townships in the state.

Members of the board of education of the village called on State Superintendent J. W. Olsen at the state capital yesterday for information on the consolidated school system. There are five rural schools in the township, that in the village being about the center of the township, and the other four being in the four corners of the square. It is proposed to build a modern school building in the village to cost from \$8,000 to \$10,000, and which will accommodate all the school children of the whole township.

MORALITY LIST DENIED BY OHAGE

Commissioner Receives Puzzling Note From Commercial Club.

Dr. Justus Ohage, city health commissioner, has declined an invitation to the Commercial Club of Chicago to appear before the committee on "St. Paul Municipal Life." The commissioner could not find the time to go. In his letter of invitation Secretary George E. Hooker, of the city club, writes: "There are a number of people here who have watched your work at a distance with satisfaction and admiration."

MILK DOPERS CONVICTED BY FOOD COMMISSION

Goodhue County Men Who Watered Their Supply Admit Their Guilt.

The state dairy and food commission was yesterday notified of the conviction at Dennison, Goodhue county, of several men who had been arrested at the instance of the commission, charged with shipping and selling to Twin City milk dealers milk which was below standard in its properties.

Eight candidates for examination for positions as teachers in the Philippines were given the papers at the federal building yesterday. There were to have been nine of the applicants, but one, a young lady living in the southern part of the state, was ruled out because she was not married to a male applicant.

Period to Short Honeymoon. Judge Dunn, of the district court, filed decree of absolute divorce yesterday in the case of Thomas A. Berriestford against Lena M. Berriestford. The two were married June 25, 1900, and the divorce is granted on the ground that the defendant deserted the plaintiff Sept. 26 of the same year, and has since lived apart from him. There was no appearance on the part of the defendant.

SCARE AT CITY HALL

Smallpox Patient Drives Clerks From Big Building.

For some time yesterday a smallpox patient was confined in one of the rooms of the health department, and as a result the officials near where the patient was located were careful to keep as far away as possible.

It was not a case concerning which there was doubt, but was fully developed and at the period when the disease is considerably contagious. It is therefore little wonder that the men working in the office of the clerk of the municipal court, the city prosecutor and other near by carefully avoided the vicinity.

D. J. Kelly was the name of the patient, and when first noticed by Patrolman Hurley was walking down Robert street, the officer's attention having been directed by the people taking to the street and avoiding the sidewalk where Kelly was walking. Hurley took charge of Kelly and escorted him to the city hall, taking the patient in through a side door.

MINNETONKA BOAT CLUB OFFICERS MUST BE MEN

Articles of Incorporation Are Filed by Yachtsmen of Big Lake.

There are no officers so far down the line in rank as captain in the newly incorporated Minnetonka Boat club. The club yesterday filed its articles with the secretary of state. Its principal place of business is Lake Minnetonka, Hennepin county; its membership fee \$10, and its annual dues an equal amount. The officers are: Commodore, vice commodore, secretary, treasurer and nine directors, and it is specifically provided that all must be of the male sex. The club is authorized to encourage yachting and to maintain a club house for the use of its members.

BOARD OF ABATEMENT SPARES HOTEL BETHEL

Decides That Rev. Morgan Conducts Charitable Institution.

As a charitable institution the St. Paul Bethel is relieved of taxes amounting to \$1,810.96 on its Wabasha street property. This action was consummated yesterday by the board of abatement acting in accordance with an opinion of the corporation attorney in which he finds that the Bethel is a charitable institution, and as such exempt from taxation.

LUMBERJACKS MAKE

They Occasionally Give Conductors and Brakemen a Strenuous Game.

Passenger crews of Northern Minnesota trains are having the usual trouble in handling unruly "lumberjacks." Several encounters between the men just coming out of the woods and conductors and brakemen of trains have been reported.

The men, who have spent a long winter in the pines, are like a lot of mischievous boys, but to their natural bent for fun is often added the fictitious energy of poor whisky, and not infrequently they try to "run" the trains.

One conductor on a Minnesota & International train, in Northern Minnesota, demonstrated to a crowd of intoxicated lumberjacks that he is something of a pugilist. A few days last week, and there have been several instances on other lines of railroad where there have been pitched battles between the train crews and the men from the pines.

DOCTORS WIN SUIT

Jury Holds Them Blameless for X-Ray Burns.

Drs. Wheaton, Rogers and Dennis have won in the damage suit in which William Henslin demanded \$22,500 from them for injuries alleged to have been suffered by him while under X-ray treatment. The jury, after being out all night, brought in its verdict for the defendants yesterday morning. The case was tried this time before Judge Brill.

Mr. Henslin first introduced his suit in the Ramsey county district court about a year ago, and it then came before Judge Orr, who granted a motion to dismiss. On an appeal from this order the supreme court granted a new trial, and evidence has been taken at great length before Judge Brill. The circumstances are peculiar and the evidence has proved of great interest to members of the medical profession, and to the general public as well.

SUPREME COURT TO DECIDE ON LIABILITY

Responsibility for Bourne's Defalcations Will Be Finally Determined.

O. H. O'Neill, assistant county attorney, announced yesterday that he will take an appeal to the supreme court in the case involving the defalcations of Walter B. Bourne during his term as deputy county auditor. Mr. O'Neill contends that Messrs. Elmud and Assin, a recurrent running series which injured his health, gave him much pain and inconvenience and prevented him from following his regular occupation as a carpenter. He demanded \$22,500 as damages.

BURTON'S CASE MAY BE HEARD IN ST. PAUL

Convicted Senator Will Appeal to Circuit Court of Appeals.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 29.—Counsel for Senator Burton today filed a motion to set aside the verdict and there of now is before the court a motion for a new trial, filed immediately after the verdict was rendered. Judge Adams will first have to dispose of these motions before sentence can be passed.

HAS VALUABLE MAPS

Historical Society Is Reclipt of Interesting Records.

The Minnesota State Historical society has received three valuable sets of maps to be added to its archives. One covers the Mississippi from the mouth of the Ohio to the Twin Cities, another is a map of the Mississippi from the Ohio to the Gulf, and a third covers the Missouri from its mouth to the Three Forks in Montana.

The maps are made on a large scale and are printed on heavy cloth paper. Those covering the Mississippi from the mouth of the Ohio to the Twin Cities, the head of navigation, are on a scale of three inches to the mile, and numerous soundings are recorded on the maps.

A colored map of Itasca state park, at the headwaters of the Mississippi, is included in the donation. This map, on a scale of four inches to the mile, shows the topography of the park as well as the lakes, sloughs and tiny streams among which originate the mighty Mississippi. This map will be framed and will be made a permanent wall map.

The Missouri river maps are on a scale of one inch to the mile and cover the Big Muddy from its juncture with the Father of Waters to the Three Forks, far above Great Falls, Mont. There are eighty-four sheets in this display. Along with the two sets covering the Mississippi, will be bound in atlas form and will constitute a valuable record for the historical society's habitations.

RAISES PRIZE SPUDS

Clay County Soil Produces Fine Potatoes.

"The Clay county potato is the belle of our country," said D. W. Meeker, the Moorhead editor and agriculturist, at the Windsor hotel last night.

"Clay county has taken a prominent place in the potato-producing belt," continued the newspaper man. "The soil in parts of our country is peculiarly adapted to the cultivation of fine potatoes. It is a sandy loam, and I venture to say that not to exceed 25 per cent of the potatoes grown in Clay county are used as food. The fine varieties planted and the superior results attained make the product in great demand for seedling purposes."
