COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 20.—St. Paul opened up here today by nearly 5,000 loyal Columbus fans and sent the whole bunch home in their own cars.

The Saints won a 7 to 1 victory and did it easily. Cheek was in great form. He had the Senators under his thumb all the time and only once was the trick of sequential hitting worked on him.

This work was done in the fourth inning, and saved Columbus from the disgrace of being shut out by the champs.

Wrigley opened up this inning with a clean hit to right and went to second while Marcan was tossing out Bowcock. Yeager doubled over Jackson's head and Wrigley came home.

In the other eight innings, only five Senators got on bases, but not one of them got to second. That shows how good Cheek was. His support was faithful.

It cannot be said that each Saint fielder is a phenom for everyone of the proffered chances were easy ones. Columbus could not offer a hard one. St. Paul got off in the first inning in hurray style. Lawler was easy but Jackson hit a hot one to center. O'Brien dipped one in left. Yeager let a ball pass him and Jackson came home. O'Brien stopped at second. 
Indoor Baseball at Preston.

Motor Cycle Club to Meet.


