NEWS OF THE CITY DR. A. A. AMES APPROACHES TRIAL WITHOUT FUNDS TO EMPLOY COUNSEL

Former Mayor of Minneapolis Is Denied Opportunity of Disposing of His Oak Lake Property to Procure Funds to Defend Himself Against Graft Indictments—An Attempt to Raise Money by Popular Subscription Fails, a Mere \$15 Being Collected—Indicted Man Declares That He Will Yet Show the People That He Has Not Been Forgotten.

Unable, on account of a ruling of Judge F. C. Brooks, of the Hennepin county district court, to dispose of his Oak Lake property to procure funds to defend himself against the latest charge of bribe-taking, Dr. A. A. Ames, four times mayor of Minneapolis, will be compelled to appear in court tomorrow to answer the recent indictment against him without being represented by counsel.

CHEAP BEEF DOES NOT BOTHER DAKOTA Capt. J. W. Baker Says Texas and Southwest Are the Sufferers.

"The low prices prevailing for beef cattle have not begun to hurt the North Dakota stock raising industry, as they have the grazing country in Texas and the Southwest," said Capt. J. W. Baker, of Bismarck, manager of the Cannon Ball Creek Cattle Company of North Dakota, who is a business visitor in St. Paul.

"Suppose that the average beef animal has depreciated \$5 per head. North Dakota has only about 300,000 head of cattle, and the loss by depreciation will amount to \$1,500,000. Texas, with 9,000,000 of beef cattle, is hurt immeasurably more than our state. The low prices are not a bad thing for a man wishing to start in the industry. He can now buy at a figure that will let him into the business on the ground floor, and as the low prices cannot continue indefinitely he will reap a handsome profit in the end.

"The state of North Dakota was never in better shape than now. There has been a big immigration, real estate values have risen immensely in the past few years, and the losses of cattle and sheep in the past winter have not been nearly so large as has been generally supposed. Cattle losses have been less than 6 per cent and sheep losses not much more than 1 per cent. In some instances men who had apparently taken every precaution to save their animals from the rigors of winter were the heaviest losers.

Lost All His Sheep. "One man built last fall a big sheep barn and went to bed one night with a sense of absolute security. His thousand sheep were thought to be safely housed, but a lower board on the shed had been removed to give the sheep air. A blizzard came up in the night and the snow blew in through the aperture. The sheep on the windward side of the building edged away from the snow and crowded the others into a corner until the entire thousand sheep perished from the snow, cold and lack of air. This was an isolated case, however, and losses to the stock industry last winter in our state were not at all large."

Capt. Baker is a prominent Democrat and said that the North Dakota Democratic delegate convention will not be held until June 21. It is so late that the factions in the party are making no effort to secure the delegation of nine for the St. Louis convention, as it is generally conceded that the contest for the presidential nomination will be practically settled by that time. He said North Dakota would send a delegation that would cast its vote for the best interests of the party at large.

MONEY IN CANALS

Irrigation of Montana Desert Lands Sends Prices Up. "The value of irrigation to the so-called desert lands of the West has been well illustrated by a sale of real estate at Bozeman," said P. M. Goodwin, of Baltimore, a special agent of the United States land office, located at Helena, Mont. who was in St. Paul yesterday. "In the Gallatin valley in Montana irrigation has been applied to much of the land originally supposed to be worthless under the desert land laws. Water had been introduced to it by an irrigation canal, and the land is easily worth the money paid for it. The general government is planning big things for Montana in the way of the development of the irrigation scheme for the West, and thousands of acres of land now considered practically worthless will be reclaimed and made as valuable as the lands in the Gallatin valley, where fancy prices now prevail."

TOO MANY OLSONS FOR ELMER EDWARD

BOOM IN BUILDING

Record for April Shows Big Increase in Permits. Comparison of the records in the office of the building inspector shows that in the month of April this year there were 208 permits issued authorizing work amounting in the aggregate to \$441,080; and in the same period of last year there were 167 permits issued for work amounting to \$485,084. Although these figures indicate a discrepancy of \$44,000 for the April permits of this year, as compared with last, that may be accounted for in the fact that there were several unusually large permits issued in April, 1903, among them that for the Foley Bros' building. The number of permits issued in April this year was much larger than for the same month last year, and the most expensive among them was that issued yesterday for finishing the work on the new armory which will amount to \$70,000.

BEGGAR ASKS ALMS OF POLICE CAPTAIN

Thomas Monahan Approaches Wrong Man and Is Sent to Workhouse. Thirty days in the workhouse is the penalty that Thomas Monahan will pay for "touching" Capt. Clark, of the Central station, on the street. Monahan met the big captain Friday and thinking he was soft, tried to separate him from some of his money by telling a hard luck story. Capt. Clark listened to Monahan's story, gave him \$1 and arrested him for begging. Yesterday Judge Finehout sentenced him to thirty days. Machine Company Sues Its Agent. Suit was begun yesterday by the Singer Sewing Machine company against R. M. Sorenson to collect \$310.26. In the complaint it is stated that Sorenson was the agent of the company at Winona, and that he still has in his possession money, goods and property to the amount demanded.

JUEB CHARGES TWO WITH DECEIVING HIM


Complains That Defendants Had No Title to Property Sold Him. Herman Jueb began a civil suit yesterday in the district court against Anastasius Golata and Theodore Gajewski, in which he asserts that Golata and Gajewski entered into a conspiracy to deceive and mislead him and obtain money from him in a real estate transaction by false representations. He says in his complaint that he made a contract with Golata for the purchase of a certain piece of property for \$75,837, and paid \$275 of the purchase price in cash, giving his notes for the remainder. He asserts that when he purchased the property Gajewski gave him certain notes for a half interest in it. Mr. Jueb says that he has since discovered that the defendants had no title to the property, or right to sell it, and that the entire transaction was for the purpose of deceiving him. He asks that the notes be signed be all canceled and that he be given judgment for the amount he paid Golata in cash.

MUNICIPAL COURT GRIND FOR MONTH OF APRIL

Seventy-eight Prisoners Sentenced and \$2,197 in Fines Collected. Collections in the municipal court for April amounted in all to \$2,197; and of that amount \$1,991 was in criminal fines payable to the city; \$55 in criminal fines payable to the state, and \$51 in civil fees. There were seventy-eight prisoners committed for terms amounting to 1,500 days. Four prisoners charged with offenses under the state laws were given preliminary examinations and three waived examination; and of the whole number six were held to await action of the grand jury upon their cases.
