RESERVATION LAND TO OPEN FOR SETTLEMENT Big Rush of Settlers to Northern Minnesota is Expected.

In less than sixty days the Red Lake, Cass Lake and Devils Lake Indian reservations will be thrown open for settlement. When the land is placed on the market a big rush of settlers is anticipated.

The Great Northern has received hundreds of letters asking for information regarding the land on the three reservations. These letters have been answered by the passenger department and from further correspondence received from the prospective settlers the railroad company believes that the rush for land will eclipse any former movement of settlers to the reservations in Minnesota and North Dakota.

The passenger department of the Great Northern yesterday issued the fifth edition of its booklet, entitled "Business Opening Along the Line of the Great Northern."

The pamphlet, which contains 125 pages, gives a detail description of every town on the lines of the Great Northern in Minnesota, North Dakota

and South Dakota. The business opportunities in these areas are enumerated and the chances for investment outlined. The booklets can be had at the general passenger office or at the city ticket office.

RAILROAD NOTES. The financial statement of the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern for the first year ending Dec. 31, 1903, made public yesterday, shows the gross earnings from operation to have been \$24,768,081; operating expenses and taxes, \$27,711,155; net earnings from operation, \$1,056,926; income from other sources, \$2,336,469; gross income, \$3,393,395, or a decrease of \$734,996 over the previous year; total net income, \$4,710,001, or a decrease of \$2,264,491 over the previous year. The surplus included \$8,534,566 spent for equipment and betterments.

Announcement was made in New York yesterday that J. P. Morgan & Co. have sold \$23,000,000 of Louisville & Nashville railroad 4 per cent collateral trust bonds which were issued last year. Notice of the dissolution of the syndicate which underwrote the bonds will be published next week.

Assistant General Passenger Agent Smith of the Northern Pacific, left last night for Yellowstone park. Mr. Smith was general auditor of the park association before he became assistant to Mr. Cheland. He goes West to close up his business with the association.

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RAILROAD NEWS

WITHDRAWS APPEAL LOOK FOR RATE WAR

Northern Lines Decide to Grant Chicago-New York Lines Hostile Over Freight Situation.

Without making any further contest, the Northern Pacific and Great Northern have decided to place in effect the distributing rates on merchandise from Crookston, Fergus Falls, St. Cloud and Brainerd. The date that the rates will become effective has not been announced, but the state railroad and warehouse commission yesterday said that the roads had assured the commission that they would abide by its ruling and the decision of Judge Kelly, of the Ramsey county district court.

On application of the business men of the towns of Western Minnesota the state railroad and warehouse commission, on Nov. 10, 1903, ordered the Northern Pacific and Great Northern to place in force distributing rates in lieu of the distance tariff rates. The commission's order gave to the five cities the same advantage in distributing rates as is enjoyed by the Twin City jobbers and shippers.

Both roads have agreed, but in January of 1902, the distributing rates were withdrawn and the old distance tariff restored. The commission then appealed to the state supreme court, asking that the railroad be forced to obey the order. Judge Kelly handed down a decision Oct. 17, 1903, sustaining the commission. However, the railroad decided to fight the case to the end and gave notice that they would appeal to the state supreme court.

It was announced yesterday that this appeal would now be withdrawn and the rates stipulated in the original order placed into effect. The companies' decision was reached after a prolonged conference between Gen. H. W. Childs, attorney for the commission, and the attorneys for the Great Northern and Northern Pacific roads.

Freight officials of the various lines having headquarters in St. Paul received word yesterday that there is likely to be a bitter freight rate war between the Chicago-New York lines. Hostilities have been in progress for three or four months, but an open rupture has thus far been averted.

Secret rate cutting and other underhanded methods practiced by some of the Eastern roads is said to be responsible for the impending rate-cutting contest.

The reduction in rates on grain and grain products a week ago was announced to meet the secret rates made by some of the lines. As a result the roads had all the business they could handle there was little trouble in maintaining agreed rates, but business during the last few months has fallen off materially, and the roads find it necessary to grant concessions to big shippers to keep their cars in service.

The so-called weak lines, it is claimed, have been the principal offenders, but the latter assert that the strong lines are doing the crooked work and have two or three years' head start in the business. The Grand Trunk threatens to go on the warpath because of its being unjustly charged with the crooked work.

A prominent official of the Grand Trunk says his company is tired of the shabby treatment it is getting from its American competitors, and "if it has to take the blame it proposes to get more of the game."

"The improvements that have been made on the Grand Trunk during the last two or three years," he said, "have bettered the position of that road. The American lines have seen that we intend to bid for traffic more boldly than

before. They know perfectly well that we can cut the rates from Chicago to tide water nearly 50 per cent and still make money on low grade stuff."
