

FASHIONS FROM VOGUE



The hat shapes are so diversified this summer that no woman should wear an unbecoming hat and have for an excuse that it is the fashion for all styles of faces, modes of hair dressing, etc., can be suited becomingly and the wearer still be up to date in headgear. Our sketch illustrates four effective summer hats of different styles. The left model is of fine crepe trimmed with red velvet ribbon, cherries and their leaves, and is a pretty model for a young woman to wear with a rather simple gown. The upper model is a boat-shaped turban of coarse brown straw trimmed with white crepe de chine and black birds. This mode is

appropriate for a shirtwaist suit or tailor gown. The lower model is of champagne maline in folds. The crown made entirely of rose leaves, the brim trimmed with stems. Under the brim is a full wreath of small June roses and leaves. This is a suitable hat for the afternoon with any light summer gown. Right figure: Elaborate hat with brim of white leghorn crown of shirred pale green chiffon, trimming of black roses, with leaves and stems hanging over brim at left side. The veil is of lace applique in white. This hat should only be worn with an afternoon or summer evening gown made rather elaborately. An effective lingerie hat,

a style that will be very much worn this summer, can easily be made at home at small cost. Buy a wire frame of a becoming shape, cover this with shirred silk mull or make the brim only of mull and the crown of straw in light colors. Then get enough lace to go around the brim twice; buy it wide enough to hang down at the back to nape of neck. In front have it only about an inch wider than the brim. Shirr the lace, fasten it to the crown tacking it here and there to the brim to hold it in place. Trim with bows of lousine ribbon the color of the crown if straw has been used, or trim with a wreath of pale pink June roses and rosettes of ribbon.
