NON-UNION MEN REACHING CHICAGO



This Shows a Company of Them Proceeding to the Stock Yards Under Police Protection

STRIKE ORDER HANGS OVER CHICAGO ROADS

Freight Handlers Called Off by President, Who Later Reconsiders Dictum Pending Peace Conference—Unionists Ready to Refuse to Handle All Deliveries From Packing Houses—Move Would Be Severe Blow to Packers

CHICAGO, July 28.—After issuing a general order that would have involved all the Chicago railroads in the stock yards strike, Lawrence J. Curran, president of the Freight Handlers' union, tonight reconsidered his action and is now holding his order in abeyance pending a conference tomorrow morning with leaders of the allied trades unions whose members are on strike.

and A. L. Ames, of Buckingham, Iowa, president of the Corn Belt Meat Producers' association, are the sponsors of the new movement for peace. Mr. Wallace and Mr. Ames came to Chicago today and immediately went into conference with the strike leaders.

The central council of the Freight Handlers' union was in session at midnight and it is stated that all preparations have been made to put the strike order in force if it shall be deemed necessary. President Curran's order, if lived up to by the freight handlers, would work a severe hardship on the packers, as it explicitly directs that union men shall handle no freight for the big packing companies, either outgoing or incoming.

Mr. Donnelly and his associates were told by Mr. Wallace of the hardship the strike was imposing on the live stock raisers, and they were asked if some concession besides those offered at the last conference between the packers and the strike leaders could not be suggested in order to bring the present conflict to an end.

At a meeting with the business agents of the local freight handlers' unions today it was decided that all men under the jurisdiction of our organization in the various railroads in Chicago be ordered not to receive or deliver any freight of the packers, whether this freight is delivered at the freight houses by teams or in cars.

Both Claim Victory Tonight both sides to the dispute at the stock yards were claiming a victory. According to the packers all the plants in Chicago are running at nearly the regular capacity. On the other hand, the labor leaders declare the packing industry in this city is completely demoralized and that business is almost at a standstill.

NEBRASKA SOLDIER DRAWS FIRST CLAIM

Veteran of Spanish War Secures Choice of Rosebud Agency Homesteads

CHAMBERLAIN, S. D., July 28.—The eagerly awaited day for the drawing of the lands of the Rosebud reservation dawned bright and sultry. An hour before the time appointed for the drawing to begin there was a crowd of 800 or 1,000 persons surrounding the building in which the registered names were to be drawn.

"Lucky" Sommers drew the lot which named him as the first to draw from the box. Shortly after 10 o'clock, at a signal from the commissioner, young Sommers inserted his hand into the box and drew out the first envelope, which he handed to the commissioner.

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TAX COLLECTIONS BREAK THE RECORD

Estimated That 97 Per Cent of Ramsey County Taxes Will Be Paid

It is estimated by County Treasurer Metzdorf that 97 per cent of the taxes owing to Ramsey county on the 1903 assessment will be paid this year. This will break all records for tax collections in the county and will be an increase in the collections of 3 per cent over last year, when the collections amounted to 94 per cent of the entire tax.

Collected Nearly \$900,000 May 31 The collections for the month of May amounted to \$1,290,875.31, and of this amount \$898,656.04 reached the office on the last day of the month.

Assassin Admits Deed One of the cyclist detectives arrested the assassin, who endeavored to escape, though wounded by splinters in the face, arm and abdomen.
