

RUSSIAN DEFENSES TOOK Von Plehve's Remains Are Interred With Solemn Services of Orthodox Church

ST. PETERSBURG, July 31.—M. von Plehve, the minister of the interior, who was assassinated Thursday morning last, was buried today, and in every city of the Russian empire church bells were tolled and masses and prayers said for the repose of the soul of the murdered minister.

The services here, which were according to the rites of the orthodox church, were of an impressive and imposing character. At 11 o'clock this morning high masses were said in the cathedral adjoining the ministry of the interior.

The entire assemblage was in full uniform, and on the arm of each one present was a badge of mourning. All held lighted tapers throughout the service, and the air was heavy with the perfume of flowers and incense.

At the most dramatic moment when the emperor came to the altar, the emperor's widow was overcome and fainted. The emperor came to the altar, and she was carried out by gentle hands.

The emperor was visibly moved, and upon the conclusion of the service he allowed the castrated, which was taken upon the shoulders of the ministers and borne down the broad steps of the cathedral.

The funeral procession was formed and the body was placed in a great white open hearse drawn by six black horses, which were blanketed from their ears to their tails in somber trappings.

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The minister stands on a plain beyond the Narva gates and at these gates a guard of 20,000 soldiers is on duty.

After a burial service in the church, the body was interred in the adjoining cemetery where rests the remains of the Russian's greatest men and at a point within a stone's throw of the grave of M. Skopininski, who was the emperor's predecessor and who also fell by the hand of an assassin less than two years ago.

The murderer of M. von Plehve has been removed from the hospital to the Wyborgsky prison. The police know the assassin's name and he is being sought.

There is no longer any doubt that the police for some time have had knowledge of the existence of a plot by a band of international revolutionaries to assassinate the emperor.

Witte is Opposed. The far-reaching character of the machinery of the ministry, and the urgent necessity for dealing with many pending matters, render it imperative that the emperor's successor to M. von Plehve immediately and it is considered certain that he will do this.

Witte, president of the council of ministers, in spite of his acknowledged great ability and the general belief that he is the man for the position seem to render his appointment a very improbable event.
