



It has been for some years regarded as the personal property of Senator Nelson. The senior senator, after a contest with Mr. Dunn, returned Monday night, determined to offer the place to James A. Martin.

It is said that Mr. Dunn, who has in public repeatedly declared that his majority would be 50,000, and that he admitted privately to Senator Nelson that were the election to be held that day he would be defeated by 30,000. The account by Mr. Dunn was sent to Martin with the invitation to come into camp. The story goes that two weeks ago Martin had resisted an offer of \$5,000 salary to take charge of the Dunn campaign. What further offers were made is not definitely known.

Maj. von Baumbach is a resident of Alexandria, an old soldier and a former secretary of state. He has held the office of collector of internal revenue for nearly eight years, and his ill health is the only cause for his prospective retirement. Maj. von Baumbach went West two months ago for his first vacation in four years. He was taken ill and he returned to his duties only this week. His continued illness, with no immediate prospect for his complete restoration to health, has created an opportunity to "take care of Martin," and there seems to be little if any doubt that when the new year rolls round Mr. Martin will be named as his successor.

PREPARING TO MANDAMUS HANSON

Democratic Nomination Certificate of Justice Calvin M. Brown Presented

Preliminary to a test of the law prohibiting the designation of candidates on the state ballot as the nominee of more than one political party, Chairman Frank A. Day, of the Democratic state central committee, late yesterday afternoon presented the nomination certificate of Calvin M. Brown, of Morris, as the nominee for associate justice of the supreme court to the secretary of state.

The certificate was accepted by George F. Brown, chief clerk to Secretary Hanson, but it will probably await the return to the city of Secretary Hanson before a formal decision will be announced by the secretary as to what he will do in the premises.

Chairman Day offered no filing fee, on the theory that Judge Brown had already paid a deposit of \$50 to the nominee of the Republican state convention, and that he could not be assessed twice.

In the event that the certificate is refused and Secretary Hanson declines to put Judge Brown's name on the ballot as the nominee of the Democratic as well as the Republican party, J. W. Arcander, of Minneapolis, who has been retained as counsel for the purpose by the Democratic committee, will institute proceedings before the supreme court in the form of an order to show cause why Secretary Hanson, why he refuses to obey the behest of the Democratic committee.

The certificate presented yesterday is attested by Capt. W. H. Harries, of Alexandria, chairman, and H. D. Thiele, of Spring Valley, secretary, of the Democratic state convention held at Minneapolis Aug. 30.

MARTIN SUCCEEDS CHAIRMAN HAMLIN

Collins' Former Manager Now in Absolute Control at Dunn Headquarters

James A. Martin is in complete control of the Republican state central committee headquarters and Robert C. Dunn's campaign. Mr. Martin's debut and the exit of Joel Heatwole and W. E. Verity yesterday marked the transformation promised in the threat made by Senator Knute Nelson, of Alexandria, in the action of the state central committee in changing management in the middle of the campaign is taken to indicate weakness and a desire to return Senator Clapp to the senate at the risk of losing the governorship.

DELAWARE REPUBLICANS FAIL TO COMPROMISE

Factions Cannot Agree as to gubernatorial Candidate

WILMINGTON, Del., Sept. 29.—The warring factions of the Republican party in Delaware made a vain effort today to compromise on a state ticket, both the Dupont (or regular) Republicans and the Addicks (or union) Republicans having held their positions, and nominated separate tickets, with the exception of presidential electors, which are the same. The hitch is over the choice of a candidate for governor, each faction insisting that it shall have the naming of the candidate.

Recently the regulars made a proposal that each side withdraw its ticket and that the regulars submit the names of five men from which the union Republicans might select one as the candidate of both factions for governor.

The state committees of both factions met today and endeavored to reach an agreement. After each committee had met separately, subcommittees were appointed to confer. Each subcommittee in turn presented a list of names from which the other might select a candidate for governor. Both proposals were rejected.

The union committee then offered to hold a joint primary election throughout the state for the purpose of allowing the voters to decide the disputed question, both factions to abide by the result. The regulars said this could not be done, as another primary election would be in violation of the law. The union men's answer to this protest was that the primary would be merely to learn the will of the voters so as to guide the conventions in making up the ticket. The regulars would not accept the proposal. There were no further negotiations and both conventions adjourned.

WOULD KEEP LA MOURE IN THE STATE SENATE

Pembina (N. D.) Man Again Nominated Foraker Is Heard at Milwaukee

Senator Judson La Moire, of Pembina, N. D., was yesterday renominated to the state senate by his constituency. Senator La Moire was in St. Paul on his return from the North Dakota irrigation congress.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Sept. 29.—Ex-Vice President Adlai E. Stevenson, formally opened the Democratic campaign in Central Illinois by addressing a mass meeting tonight.
