Secretary Shaw Partially Reverses Cigar Order

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 29.-The washing to be treasury has issued a statement in the imported cigar stamp matter, in which he permits the order made by Assistant Secretary Armstrong to stand so far as it relates to reducing the size of the stamp and to attaching it in a less consciences in lace. attaching it in a less conspicuous place on the box. "The testimony established the fact that the present stamp is used as a trademark by the cigar importers; that this trademark is valuable to them and confers an advantage upon them as against the manufacturers of them as against the manufacturers of cigars in the United States, and that cigars are in effect the only commodity imported into the United States that receives the benefit of such a trade mark. In view of the fact that this government stamp in its present form undoubtedly gives a pecuniary advan-

and the department is in its essence proper.

The government's business is to collect the revenue and to provide, so far as possible, against fraud, but it is not the government's business to furnish a guaranty in the form of a trademark for the benefit of the goods. This should be left in the tobacco business exactly as it is in all other businesses. The result of the decision will protect the domestic manufacturers from a customs stamp available as an advertisement, and protect the importer by giving him a stamp of a distinctive color, which can be seen by the purchaser if he cares to make examination."
