

IN THE FIELD OF POLITICS KRAHMER REMAINS IN THE BACKGROUND County Auditor's Behavior in Matter of Assessments Con- trasts With Last Year

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The increase by the state board of equalization of 25 per cent on class 16 has recalled the action of County Auditor E. G. Kraemer when the St. Paul board of equalization had this class under consideration a year ago. The increase made by the state board was against the vehement protest of H. W. Fagley, Ramsey county member of the state board, and was larger than was made by the state board in any of the other large counties of the state. Hennepin county's assessment on class 16 was raised by 15 per cent and St. Louis county's assessment was boosted 10 per cent.

The power behind the state board's action can be remotely guessed at, but in view of the county auditor's zeal a year ago to secure an increase in the assessment of class 16, a good many eyes naturally are looking in his direction.

Kraemer Busy a Year Ago

A year ago, when the St. Paul board of equalization was in session, Mr. Kraemer appeared before the board, according to members who were present at the time, and urged a 20 per cent increase of class 16. He was defeated in this movement, and threatened to take his grievance to the state board. At the meeting of the state board a year ago an increase of 5 per cent was voted, and the 15 per cent difference was property to the owners of this class of property.

In the Background This Year

This year, inasmuch as Mr. Kraemer is a candidate for re-election, he made no open attempt to secure a raise of the assessment by the local board, but the recent action of the state board of equalization, composed of members of his own political faith, has naturally aroused a suspicion that possibly the Ramsey county auditor, who is known to have abandoned a track on which he is right or wrong, may know more of the increase than he would like to admit to the men who will have to pay the increased valuations that he change had not been made.

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ARGUE PETITION SUPREME COURT Attorneys Seek Construction of Statute Touching Fusion on Judicial Ticket

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Attorneys argued before the court nearly all Wednesday on the petition of Frank A. Day, chairman of the Democratic state central committee, by which it is sought to secure the placing of the name of Calvin L. Brown, of Morris, on the official state ballot with the designation "Democrat" after his name as well as the word "Republican."

Chief Justice C. M. Start and the three judges of the district court designated by the governor to sit in the case spent two hours in consultation, considering the questions of law involved in the issue presented, but no decision was rendered at the conclusion of the conference.

The secretary of state had officially notified the court that a decision is desired not later than Oct. 8, and it is expected that a formal decision will be filed within a day or two.

The arguments brought out an entirely new point not raised in the original petition, and it is necessary to decide the question raised by the petition presented to the court by the Democratic state central committee.

Argue Unconstitutionality
