Why Copper is Active

The movement in Amalgamated Copper was directly attributable to the active demand for copper both here and in Europe. The buying of the stock was on a large scale and its rise was of some sympathetic effect on the steel stocks, owing to the sympathetic bond between the markets for the two products. The advance in some of the other industrials seemed to be due indirectly to sympathy with the movement in Amalgamated Copper, especially that in Sugar. St. Paul recovered sharply from yesterday's break without renewal of the rumors regarding a Northern Securities settlement.

The reported utterances of a Japanese statesman to the probable duration and cost of the war were the subject of some dissatisfaction in all fimancial markets. Revised estimates in favor of larger grain yields were prevalent and helped the market. The currency movement up to Thursday evening, as reported during the day, showed a smaller withdrawal by the subtreasury than last week, but the shipments on balance by express brought the probable cash loss to over \$7,000,000. The supposition that there has been large speculative liquidation in the stock market points to a contraction in loans. The money market today was little affected beyond a rise above 2 per cent in the call money rate. This increased a growing disposition to take profits and prices slipped off easily in the final hour, with little left of the day's gains at the close.

Bonds were steady. Total sales, par value, \$3,215,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.
