MAN IS ROBBED AND THROWN FROM TRAIN

Was on His Way Home to Wisconsin and Cannot Recover

CLOUD, Minn., Oct. 18.—Ebenzer Williams, of Wild Rose, Wis., was picked up unconscious beside the Willmar track at Waite park this morning and now lies at the point of death at the hospital. He was evidently thrown from the train by hoboes who had robbed him. An empty pocketbook was found near where the man lay, and there was but little change in his pockets. The police regard it as the work of tramps who are working the freight trains. Williams had been working in Kalspell, Mont., according to letters found on his person, and was going home at the urgent solicitation of his mother and brother. It is not expected that he will live through the night, and officers have been detailed upon the case.

AMES CASE GOES TO THE JURY TODAY

The Former Mayor Is Tangled by the State's Attorney

Tonight the jury which has been summoned to try Dr. A. Ames, former mayor of Minneapolis, on the charge of accepting a bribe of \$20 from a woman of the town, will retire for deliberation. The taking of testimony was concluded yesterday afternoon and Judge Kerr, the special prosecuting attorney, began his argument to the jury. He did not finish it before court adjourned, but will conclude this morning.

Then Attorney Cary, for the defense, will make his talk, and it is expected the case will go to the jury this evening. County Attorney Boardman was called as a witness for the defense, but he appeared with a big law book and pleaded exemption and the court sustained him. Dr. Ames was subjected to a severe cross examination, and he did not strengthen his case in the least. On the contrary, he admitted many things which he had denied on direct examination.

They expressed the need of more education and more churches and more schools for industrial and professional training. An interesting phase of the discussion was that presented by negroes who are engaged in church and educational work among their people.
