

MINNEAPOLIS USES LONG WORDS TO INSPIRE AWE

Republican Candidate for Mayor or Startles Auditors by His Erudition

David Percy Jones, the Republican candidate for mayor of Minneapolis, held forth at the Fourth ward Republican hall for a few moments last evening.

In his short talk he declared that under the administration of the present Democratic mayor the city had been given over to the vicious element which had things its way.

He used words as long as an angle worm and tangled like a skein of yarn after a kitten is through with it.

The word "superlative" did not worry the crowd in the least for there were a number of empty chairs. When he tackled "heterogeneous" there was a shudder and some persons started for the door. Then he sprang "lackadaisical" and the policeman who had been detailed to the meeting started for the patrol box for the purpose of calling the hurry-up wagon, but was stopped by a man with a dictionary who showed that the use of \$4 words did not constitute disorderly conduct.

The Republican candidate for mayor said he proposed to place a patrol limit on vice and would restrict it to certain localities.

"You can go so far and no farther will be my state with a dictionary for people," said the Republican candidate for mayor.

Jones Attacks Haynes He expressed himself as sorry that the mayor of the city, who is a candidate for re-election on the Democratic ticket, had been in the city and that he would not indulge in any personalities, but he could not refrain from declaring that the city of Minneapolis had been given over to the vicious element and the very name of the town was besmirched.

Loren Fletcher, who wants one more term in congress, was there, and so was Congressman John H. Gilman, the chairman of the Republican county committee, and the former congressman in his campaign for another term in the house of representatives.

Ray W. Jones was on hand and so was Judge Hefflinger, who was the chairman of the meeting. Sherman Smith, whose right to represent the Fourth ward as a member of the legislature was contested in the supreme court, had a seat on the platform, and T. H. Gilman, the chairman of the Republican county committee, was much in evidence. There were about 200 men, women and children present.

The committee which arranged the meeting is entitled to a vote of thanks for every chair it had placed a copy of a Dunn organ printed in St. Paul, and these served to save the trousers of the auditors from the mud on the dirt which had attached itself to the chairs. The papers served no other purpose.

Halvor Steenerson, of Crookston, is another congressman who has been imported to labor for "Uncle Loren." He held forth in a little dance hall in the Sixth ward and was greeted with great acclaim by the few persons who assembled at the place.

Dunn Talks Tonight

Tonight Robert C. Dunn, who has aspirations for the governorship, will be in Minneapolis and is promised he will make three speeches. He will talk in the Fifth, Eighth and Eleventh wards. In the Eighth ward he will have as a running mate G. L. Marston, the manager of the Collins campaign in Hennepin county, and in the other wards the speakers who will attempt to support his candidacy will be P. Jones, T. J. Read and W. E. Cullin, the last two unknown to fame.

Saturday night he will speak in the First, Ninth and Tenth wards.
