

IN THE FIELD OF POLITICS ESTIMATES SHOW ALL COUNTIES MAKE HIM A CERTAIN

has made a good fight against tremendous odds and two or three are very hopeful of success.

In the Sixth district, Cleve W. Van Dyke's chances are more than even for an election. He speaks of him particularly, for his chances are believed to be the strongest of any of the seven running. The congressional candidates have made their fights without outside assistance and have depended on their individual efforts. They have gone into contests that were almost hopeless from the start and are entitled to the praise of every loyal Democrat.

The feeling of confidence in the result of the state ticket's success at Democratic headquarters in the Gillfillan block, was not shared by the Republican forces in the Manhattan building. There an air of deep depression was evident. Gloom more dense than the smoke of the campaign cigar that settled over the rooms.

Chairman Hamlin was asked for a statement showing his claims. He said that he, James A. Martin and C. H. Warner had united in a statement, published in the afternoon papers. He was asked to be specific as to where his committee expected the majorities. He then advised the questioner not to worry.

Mr. Hamlin's committee, in its signed statement, contents itself with the claim that "Dunn will have a decisive majority." It gives no figures either by congressional districts or by counties to confirm its alleged belief. The committee claims the state for Roosevelt by 75,000, and claims the election of nine Republican congressmen. The statement is in reality a campaign document designed to secure votes for Mr. Dunn. For this reason it is not reproduced.

Chairman Day, during the afternoon, issued the following statement, as setting forth the claims of the Democratic state central committee:

"The result, so far as the governorship is concerned, has passed the stage of doubt. Johnson will surely carry seven of the nine congressional districts and will be elected by a majority that will astonish his most sanguine supporters. I shall not be surprised if it reaches 50,000.

"No man in Minnesota ever saw anything approaching the present state of affairs.

"It is a revolution.

"The Republican bosses are powerless to stem the tide, and privately admit that they have little hope of saving the governorship. We have conducted a clean campaign—have no apologies to make, and have a kindly feeling towards all humanity, including Brothers Hamlin and Mitchell and James A. Martin, to whom we have special reasons for feeling thankful. Let the battle proceed!"

The following are the estimates made by The Globe's correspondents:

Atkin, Nov. 5.—In this normally Republican county, Johnson will carry by a majority of 100 votes.

Barnes, Nov. 5.—Johnson will carry by a majority of 100 votes.

Becker, Nov. 5.—Johnson is strong in Becker county, and the fact of grave Republican defection is shown in the extent of strong anti-Dunn claims. The county is claimed for Johnson by 150 votes.

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Anoka, Nov. 5.—Anoka has been the scene of a bitter fight for months before and after the Republican state convention. Dunn will carry it by about 200 plurality.

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fair to about evenly divide its vote between the two candidates for governor. No material advantage will accrue to either candidate by his majority in Olmsted.

Otter Tail, Nov. 5.—Otter Tail county will give Johnson a majority of approximately 1,000. Fergus Falls is especially strong for the Democratic candidate for governor.

Pine, Nov. 5.—Pine county will carry Johnson by 225. Johnson will carry it by not less than 150 plurality.

Pipestone, Nov. 5.—There is deep feeling here in the contest for governor. Indications point to a close vote and it is almost impossible to forecast the result.

Polk, Nov. 5.—A forecast of the result looks as though Dunn would carry the county by very small majority. A month ago the Dunn men were claiming 2,000 majority. If they get 300 for their candidate they will do well indeed. Possibly 150 is more like the real figure.

Pope, Nov. 5.—The strongest Republican county in the state proportionally will give Johnson a majority of 100.

Ramsey, Nov. 5.—E. L. Murphy, member of the Democratic state central committee, and usually a well informed politician, said yesterday that A. Johnson would carry Ramsey county by 2,000, and that the margin might be increased to 3,000.

Red Lake, Nov. 5.—There has been a great upsurge of politics in this county in the past three weeks. The county will now give Johnson about 300 majority.

Redwood, Nov. 5.—Politicians of both parties agree that the result in this county on governor will be about even vote.

Renville, Nov. 5.—The probable result in this county is that Johnson will carry the county by 400. The Lind-Peterson debate is credited with changing 150 votes in the county.

Rice, Nov. 5.—Rice county, ordinarily Republican, will give John A. Johnson 1,300 majority.

Rock, Nov. 5.—The vote in Rock county on governor will be about a tie on candidates for governor.

Roseau, Nov. 5.—Roseau county gave Lind 205 majority over Van Sant in 1902, and Van Sant 207 majority over Roseau in 1902. The vote for Johnson will follow closely that of a first year ago. He is sweeping change takes place in the next few days Johnson will carry Roseau county by 150 majority.

St. Louis, Nov. 5.—A great change for the better, from the standpoint of the Democratic party, has taken place here in the past few weeks. Dunn's majority will be reduced to a much lower figure than was first expected. He is credited with about 1,000 in the county.

Scott, Nov. 5.—Dunn is a very likely candidate in this county. Johnson will be his major.

Sherburne, Nov. 5.—The Republican party family quarrel will cost Dunn many votes in Sherburne county. The county will not be more than 100.

Sibley, Nov. 5.—Johnson's plurality in Sibley county will be about 300.

Stearns, Nov. 5.—A conservative estimate of Johnson's majority in this county places the figure at between 3,500 and 4,000, while the more enthusiastic Democrats claim a much larger majority. The vote will be exceedingly heavy here, especially if the weather keeps up, as the farmers are making the county a safe and sound vote.

St. Cloud, Nov. 5.—Years ago Van Sant received in this county a very large vote. A majority of 4,500 is perhaps a safe and sound estimate. Johnson will carry the county by 2,000 to one, or to other words, will receive a majority of about 500 here.

Steele, Nov. 5.—In this normally Republican county a conservative forecast gives Johnson the county by 100.

Morris, Nov. 5.—The county is going to be close. Johnson has a shade the best of it, with probably 100 to the good.

Todd, Nov. 5.—Aided by a factional fight, the Democratic candidate for governor will carry Todd county by about 200.

Swift, Nov. 5.—The prospects are that John A. Johnson will come out of Swift county by about 400 majority.

Traverse, Nov. 5.—The indications are that Johnson will carry this county. He should have fully 250 majority.

Wabasha, Nov. 5.—Johnson will carry the county by less than 200. He will receive the votes of many Republicans, but as an offset, a few scattering Democrats as an offset.

Wadena, Nov. 5.—Johnson will carry Wadena county by 200 and the city by 100. Van Sant carried the county in 1902 by 257.

Waseca, Nov. 5.—From reliable reports it is believed that Johnson will carry the county from 100 to 200. The normal Republican majority is 400.

Washington, Nov. 5.—Washington county may give Dunn a small majority, but it will not carry him.

Watson, Nov. 5.—Mr. Dunn's majority will be reduced in round numbers to 100.

Wilkin, Nov. 5.—Johnson will have all of Lind's strength and the additional vote he commands for himself. He will add 200 nearly to his string from Wilkin county's vote.

Winona, Nov. 5.—That Winona county will give a majority for J. A. Johnson for governor is about as certain as anything can be in politics. Under ordinary conditions Winona county is Democratic on national and state issues. It is a fact that he claimed Winona as his home. In 1902, when John Lind, who is very popular here, was the gubernatorial candidate opposing Mr. Van Sant, the county gave Lind a majority of 486. There is some Republican opposition and it is probably a safe estimate that Mr. Johnson will carry the county by 700 majority. This is about half of the gain made by the Democrats and the Republicans.


Wright, Nov. 5.—At a conference of Republican leaders here today the county was given up for Dunn. The leaders will support him at 2:30 o'clock. State Superintendent Wright county will give Johnson a small majority. Two weeks ago the Dunn men claimed it by Lind for their man.

Yellow Medicine, Nov. 5.—Yellow Medicine county will give Johnson and Winston at least 400 majority.

GRAND MEADOW HEARS TAWNEY'S OPPONENT

Mr. Nelson Speaks for Judge Lovely and Non-Partisan Judiciary

GRAND MEADOW, Minn., Nov. 5.—The Democratic candidate for congress against Tawney, addressed a gathering of fully 400 people in the opera house at this place. The greater part of his hearers were Republicans, but the cheerer enthusiastically every reference to John A. Johnson. Mr. Nelson devoted his address largely to national issues. With reference to the tariff he said: "I have no harsh words to utter against the protection of our infant industries, but I unflinchingly oppose the protection of our infant industries." The speaker lives in Freeborn county, the home of Justice John A. Lovely, nominated by the Democrats to succeed himself as an associate justice of the supreme court. Mr. Nelson spoke in high terms of Justice Lovely and urged the support of a non-partisan state judiciary ticket.

DEMOCRATS PREPARE FOR ELECTION DAY

County Executive Committee and Candidates Canvass Situation

At a meeting between the Democratic county executive committee and the county candidates the local political situation was thoroughly canvassed and the returns from the precincts considered. It was shown from the returns of the precinct committees that the local registration is largely in favor of the Democrats, and that there is no doubt of the election of the county candidates. That John A. Johnson will head his ticket in almost every precinct in the city, and that in the First and Seventh wards he will run far ahead. Based on the figures presented it was shown that Johnson will carry the county by more than 3,000. Arrangements were made for the appointment of challengers, who will be expected to assist in getting out the vote. It was decided to engage thirty-three hacks for Tuesday, and to make a most strenuous effort to get all the Democrats to the polls early. The extremely large vote may not all be polled unless those who find it possible vote at an early hour.
