North Dakota Now Looks Good to M. J. McGrath. Northern Minnesota Dunn Manager Through With Game. 'I am through with Minnesota politics, and am going to leave tomorrow for New Jersey to eat lobsters, clams and other crustacea,' said J. D. Jones, state receiver of the United States land office at Cass Lake, last night at the Windsor hotel.

Mr. Jones was one of R. C. Dunn's managers in Northern Minnesota both before and after the state convention, and is very much disgusted with the attitude of the thousands of independent Republicans who worked and voted for John A. Johnson.

'I'll be a good square Democrat who has fought me for the last twenty years,' he said, in explanation of his feelings, 'but the English language will not permit me to express my real feelings against the alleged Republicans who bolted the candidate of the party for governor. I served in the senate with John A. Johnson and am glad to be known as one of his friends, but as a party, our people had no right to vote for him. It settles me in politics. I will have no more to do with the game.'

When informed that he had no interest in the matter McGrath kicked the small stand over and jumped on it with both feet.
