METZDORF'S STAFF TO WALK THE PLANK

County Treasurer-Elect Foot Prepares to Swing His Big Ax

A clean sweep from cellar to garret is the programme of Jesse Foot, county treasurer-elect, with reference to the staff now employed in the office.

Mr. Foot paid his first official visit to the office yesterday afternoon, and was received by Treasurer P. J. Metzendorf. Mr. Metzendorf informed Mr. Foot that while harboring intentions to ask for a recount, at the same time he had placed every feature of the office over in readiness to turn the office over to the new administration as soon as the new year began.

When seen regarding his staff, Mr. Foot declined to give out the names of its members until this afternoon. He confirmed the exclusive story printed in The Globe Wednesday morning to the effect that Charles W. Cronk was to be deputy treasurer, but said that the names of the other members would remain a secret until today.

Says New Staff is Strong "When the names of the new staff are made public," he said, "the people will see that the staff is competent to handle the work, and that the administration of the office will be a thoroughly business one, and not an easy-going happy family affair, as some people have been saying."

During the afternoon, however, it leaked out that Charles J. Carlson, who has been a clerk in the office for the past decade, would be the only one of the old staff to remain. He is regarded as harmless as far as politics are concerned, and is thoroughly suited to the purpose and will accommodate a sufficient number of people to assure the financial success of the venture, making it possible to conduct the saengerfest without calling upon the persons who make the guaranty.

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ST. PAUL SECURES SOGG FESTIVAL OF OUR WESTERN SAENGERBUND

Citizens Assemble in Mass Meeting at Mozart Hall and Decide to Construct a Canvas-covered Auditorium in the Downtown Baseball Park Capable of Seating 5,500 People—St. Paul Saengerfest Association to Raise Guaranty Fund of \$25,000 Will Be Incorporated

The 1906 saengerfest of the Northwestern Saengerbund will be held in St. Paul in a specially constructed canvas-covered auditorium in Lennon's down-town baseball park.

This was the decision reached at a mass meeting of citizens held in Mozart hall last evening, at which a majority of the hundred persons who pressed themselves enthusiastically in favor of the proceeding, declaring that it will not be difficult to secure the guaranty fund of \$25,000.

The committee in charge of the preliminary arrangements, of which Otto W. Rohland is chairman, was authorized to proceed at once to organize and incorporate the St. Paul Saengerfest association, elect officers and transact the necessary preliminary business to bring the project to the attention of the people of St. Paul.
