

### IRISH NATIONALIST PARTY MAY SPLIT

#### Dillon and Sexton and Followers Threaten to Secede From Redmond's Leadership

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The Irish Nationalist party is on the verge of a serious split within its own ranks. Unless some settlement can quickly be arrived at Messrs. Dillon and Sexton, with their personal following, will secede from the leadership of John Redmond. In this event Mr. Redmond will have the aggressive support of William O'Brien, over whom a dispute has arisen.

In recent speeches in Ireland Mr. Redmond is held to have openly sided with Mr. O'Brien regarding the differences of opinion which have long existed between Mr. O'Brien and the

Dillon-Sexton-Davitt faction. It is stated on good authority that Mr. Redmond has been told that unless he withdraws support from Mr. O'Brien secession will result. No definite conclusion has been reached, but it is understood that Mr. Redmond prefers to throw his lot with Mr. O'Brien. In the event of the breach becoming definite, it is thought the party would at the moment be fairly evenly divided, Mr. O'Brien's tremendous popularity in the south being offset by the influence of Mr. Sexton's powerful organ, the Freeman's Journal, and the more radical following of Mr. Davitt and Mr. Dillon. Such a division probably would favor the followers of Mr. Healy with what might become the balance of power, and this, according to present indications, would be thrown in favor of Messrs. Redmond and O'Brien.

The present internal crisis is the result of gradually increasing disagreement over the action instigated by Mr. O'Brien and carried out by Mr. Redmond in their famous land purchase conference with the Irish landlords.

### TIGERS BESIEGE VILLAGE

Four Man-Eaters Terrorize a Community in India

The police station at Katigora was a few days ago the scene of great excitement and horror when the corpse of unfortunate Nidhar Patni, who met his lamentable death from the claws of a tiger, was carried there for inspection.

Four persons were killed during the course of a few weeks, besides a number of persons maimed, while carrying away of cattle is going on almost every day. The tigers that have caused this great havoc here are now proved to be four in number, one tiger, one tigress and two big cubs, and our sympathetic deputy commissioner is said to have offered a reward of 40 rupees for the destruction of each of them.

The ferocious brutes, having taken their abode by the side of the only important road leading from Katigora to the village of Ganganagar, have practically laid siege to the village, with the result that communication on foot has been stopped. Several attempts that had been made to afford relief to the unfortunate villagers were all unsuccessful.

A party of local sportsmen, mustering strong and equipped with firearms, marched into the jungle at the head of our energetic Nidhar Chaudhar, Maulvi Mohammed Israil to hunt the tigers, but with all their efforts they could not make the master stripes come out of their recesses. The next day, however, another party, consisting of four European gentlemen, with a large number of coolies, surrounded the jungle and succeeded in arousing the tigers, which managed to escape through the line without giving the hunters an opportunity of discharging their bullets.

They pursued the animals and made them swim across a beel. It is a matter of regret that the brave hunters failed to hit the animals while they were struggling in the water, although a good number of shots were fired. The tigers got to the other side of the beel without encountering further opposition, and fell upon the said Nidhar Patni, who was grazing cattle near his house, and killed him on the spot.—Weekly Indian Chronicle.
