

A. S. Andrews, of Norcross, Minn., thinks Farmer is the man who rode the freight trains between Willmar and Larimore during the summer. He said a man who looks like the photograph of Farmer visited his store on several occasions.

AMES' TRIAL DELAYED

Defense Alleges That Important Witness Is in Dakota

The fifth trial of Dr. A. A. Ames, former mayor of Minneapolis, who is charged with accepting a bribe from a woman to return for police protection, did not begin yesterday morning, but was continued until Thursday.

E. B. Casey, attorney for Dr. Ames, said the presence of a witness who is in North Dakota was desired. This witness is August Hayden, a housekeeper who testified against Dr. Ames on the first trial. At the second trial she was called by the defense and attempted to impeach T. E. Brown and Irwin A. Gardner and other Ames lieutenants. On the third and fourth trials she was missing.

The representatives of several Minneapolis newspapers were present in court yesterday morning, and it is said it was the intention of the defense to prove by these witnesses there was a conspiracy to attempt to implicate others in the graft deals and to show that Dr. Ames was ignorant of what was being done. Certain attorney names may be mentioned in connection with this line of defense if it is started.

BORDEN OUTBIDS HIM FOR FAMOUS LOCANDA

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Some of the most valuable of the entire Old Glory horse sale were scheduled for sale today and tomorrow. The greatest horse for sale today was Locanda, holder of the stallion race record for 1904, and also the world's record for one and a half miles at 2:15 1/2. There are several other horses of national reputation as racers included in today's offerings.

Several thousand spectators assembled in Madison Square Garden tonight for the Old Glory horse sale and to witness the auction of Locanda, the holders of the world's race record at one and one-half miles, the holder of the stallion race record of 1904 and having a record of 2:08 1/2, but since then has reduced his record to 2:03 1/2. The bidding began at \$2,000 and jumped by \$100 bids to \$5,000 mark, at which price Walter J. Snyder bought the stallion. Mr. Snyder was acting as agent and he believes that the horse will remain the property of Mr. Borden.

The contending bidder was Charles E. Tanner, of Cleveland, superintendent of the C. & G. Billings, owner of Lou Dillon and Major Delmar. He bid \$2,000.

JEALOUSY CAUSES A MAN TO SHOOT

New York Treasury Employee Kills a Handsome Widow

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 28.—Joseph F. White, for ten years orderly in the state treasurer's office, today shot Mrs. Josephine Russell, a handsome widow. Jealousy was the only apparent motive. White is sixty-five years old and a widower. His home before he entered the treasury department was in Binghamton. He had just been released from the hospital and his friends claim that he was intoxicated when he did the shooting.

Mrs. Russell was thirty-five years old. White formerly boarded with the woman. Early this morning he appeared at a milk depot where Mrs. Russell traded and spent the day until 4:30. When she came, without word he shot her in the neck. She fell and White fired three more shots into her body. He made no attempt to escape and when arrested denied committing the crime.

Mrs. Russell was taken unconscious to a hospital, where she died early this evening.

Haggin Buys Africander

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Africander, winner of the Suburban and many other good races in 1903, has been sold by J. W. Delmeil to J. B. Haggin, who bred the horse. The price is said to have been a trifle less than Delmeil paid at the dissolution of the Hampton stable partnership July 5, when he bought him in at \$15,000. White, the son of Ruby and Africa's Queen is ultimately destined for the Haggin stud, it is likely he will race some during the next season.

FRAUDULENT BOND CASE IS ON TRIAL

Ex-President of Haiti and His Cabinet Are Among the Accused

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, Nov. 28.—The opening day of the trial of the fraudulent bond case passed without incident. Of the thirty-three persons accused, among whom are ex-presidents Sam, his ministers and high officials of the National Bank of Haiti, thirteen were present, the others having fled. It is expected that the trial will last a month. The French and German ministers to Haiti are in attendance.

The trial grows out of an act of the Haitian congress in 1902 authorizing the constitution of the national debt in a bond issue of approximately \$6,000,000 and an additional \$212,252 to be paid the bank for financing the deal. Before the transaction was completed the present government of President Alexis Nord came into power when the officials of the bank were thrown into prison on Nov. 3, 1902, on the charge of conspiracy with the secretary of the treasury, Feine, in fraudulently issuing bonds from \$200,000 to \$850,000 in bonds, and of bribery. This alleged overissue of bonds, it appears from the papers in the case, was received and appropriated by the bankers as their commissions, which the Nord government charges was unauthorized in the budget.

Among the persons accused are J. de la Myre Mory, G. Ohlirsch, R. Tippenhauer and Jean Baptiste de Puybadout, the first and last named being Frenchmen and one or both of the others Germans. These were in the order named president, vice president, chief of portfolio and teller of the National Bank of Haiti. They were among the most prominent and wealthy residents of Port au Prince. Others of the accused are Secretary Brunus St. Victor, Villabrun Guillaume, Hebeard Roy, Lycurgus and Demosthenes Sam, of the Sam cabinet and a former native president of the senate named Stewart. It is alleged that in prison the accused were subjected to the greatest hardships and exposed to indignities and sanitary dangers.
