PROTEST AGAINST TAXES

People Object to Paying the Tithes Assessed Against Them

C. W. Johnson, the county treasurer, and C. J. Minor, the city assessor, are trying to "square" themselves with an incensed populace which finds that its taxes have been increased over the amount of previous years. The county treasurer who has just assumed office is busy at the telephone informing people who make protests that he did not levy the taxes and his duty is to collect the amount that is claimed to be due. The city assessor who has been re-elected has found it necessary to prepare printed slips which are sent out with each tax statement, which in effect inform the taxpayer that if he finds his assessment has been increased over the return made by him it was "due to the arbitrary action of the state board of equalization and not by the city assessor."

LAWMAKERS SHAPE UP COMMITTEES

Chairmanships of the South Dakota Senate Bodies Are Announced

SIOUX CITY, S. D., Jan. 5.—The house committee on privileges and elections is considering the Douglas county contest. The house has business today. Bills were introduced in the senate, the first being by Lawson, providing for the taking of a census and collection of vital statistics, putting the secretary of the state historical society at the head of the work. Bills were introduced to reduce the contract rate of interest from 12 to 10 per cent, by Wagner, and several by Stoddard to regulate the Cheyenne river reservation and for a 640-acre homestead law.

Chronometer Records Days, Months, Years and Time of Cities

PARIS, Jan. 5.—M. Leroy, the well known watchmaker of this city, has just completed, after seven years' work, what is considered the most complicated watch in the world. It is gold, and only a little larger than the ordinary timepiece, but it makes up for its size by its complexity. Besides marking the hours and seconds, it indicates the days, months and years (making automatically the necessary changes in leap years), the lunar phases, the seasons, the equinoxes and equinoxes, the time of 125 cities of the world, and the hours of the rising and setting of the sun.
