ICE SHEETS READY FOR THE BONSPIEL

Continuance of Present Weather Will Make Curlers Happy

Splendid sheets of ice now cover all the rinks at the Nushka Curling club, where the twelfth annual bonspiel of the North-western Curling association will open at 9 o'clock this morning, and it is now up to the weather man, should he produce good cold weather for three days the meeting can be completed after that time upon the three covered rinks and with anything like winter weather the ice will be good.

CHESBRO TELLS JUST HOW HE KNOWS IT

Latest Explanation of the Much Discussed Split Ball

BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 22.—Willing to let the other pitchers use it if they can, Jack Chesbro for the first time tells of the "split ball," by which he won forty-one victories last season, and which also lost New York the championship, when one of Chesbro's split balls went wild and allowed Criger to score Boston's winning run.

Chesbro's explanation will undoubtedly cause a sensation in the baseball world. It throws an entirely new light on the ball, which promises in a way to revolutionize the sport. All last summer Chesbro persistently refused to tell the secret. Manager Clark Griffith did not know how Chesbro got his control, and scores of pitchers in the two leagues vainly tried to emulate him. Chesbro was the kingpin pitcher last season, and on his own statement over thirty of the forty-one victories he secured were made possible by the split ball.

Many baseball pitchers will be surprised when they read Chesbro's explanation, and, according to him, fans and experts who have thought they knew something of the ball have been groping in the dark.

The wetting of the ball by Chesbro is done simply and solely in order that the ball may slip off the index and middle fingers first and from the thumb last. In all other curves the ball leaves the fingers last and the thumb first. The index finger is secured the power to make a ball curve.

By wetting the ball Chesbro has been able to make the ball curve in the first and thumb last, and from the thumb was his use of the ball last season. It is not necessary to wet the ball as thoroughly as some pitchers have supposed. In fact, Chesbro just moistened the ball enough to remove the friction.

Chesbro's thumb caused the downfall of the heavy American league last season and not the moisture of the ball. This has also been supposed that the split ball must be pitched slowly. Chesbro, on the contrary, says the ball is only effective when pitched with speed. He frankly admits that he would not have done to make more batting, and feels that before another season has passed he would have been able to control the control of the mysterious "split ball," to the great detriment of the batsmen.

Chesbro consented to tell of the "split ball" and even then he refused to tell how he was able to make the ball drop three inches or a foot.

Chesbro's statement follows: "I have always been a pitcher to stay and is easily the most effective ball that can possibly be used. It is easy to pitch, once you have had a few days' practice. I can read an explanation of it that was anywhere near correct.

"I can make it drop a foot and a half. It is only in the first few weeks of last season that the New York catchers hurt my fingers when I used the ball. To the close of the season I signalled just how the ball would drop, and whether it would drop straight or to the right.

"The split ball cannot be pitched so that it will drop towards a right handed batsman. It is made to drop straight or to the outside. Of course to a left handed batsman it can drop to the right.

MRS. CHADWICK IS IN MORE TROUBLE

Officials Find High Priced Laces and Ivories in Her Home

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 22.—United States Customs Collector Leach has found valuable ivories and laces belonging to Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick in the Chadwick home on Euclid avenue. Mr. Leach is going to learn whether Mrs. Chadwick has been importing the goods, all of which have been imported. The goods were taken to the office of Receiver Nathan Loeser and examined by an expert.

They are said to be worth at least \$10,000, most of that sum being spent in a number of fine and expensive articles of lace such as curtains, collars, handkerchiefs, etc. Some of the handkerchiefs are valued at \$100 each. It is shown that the duty has not been paid upon the goods they will be sold to recover duty and the proceeds will become a part of the fund which Mr. Loeser is accumulating for the benefit of the Chadwick creditors.

An official of the treasury department at Washington is in the city assisting Collector Leach in the investigation of the case. It is shown that Mrs. Chadwick has brought the laces and handkerchiefs into the city without paying duty on them. The federal government will prefer the charge of smuggling against her and the goods mentioned will be held as evidence against her.

Another interesting phase of the Chadwick developments is that Receiver Nathan Loeser will not permit Mrs. Chadwick to go to her Euclid avenue home until her right to do so has been passed upon by Federal Judge Wing. This question will not come up, however, until Mrs. Chadwick is released from the city. She is allowed to go home she will not be permitted to have possession of any of her house furnishings.


