Abolishes Canal Commission

To Describe Immigrants Minutely

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—Representative Jenkins (Wis.) today introduced a bill making it the duty of the commissioner of immigration to cause to be registered a history of every alien entering the United States, giving a description of the person, age, nationality, last place of residence, intended residence in the United States, date of arrival, port of arrival and vessel in which he came. Provision is made for the naturalization of aliens. Among other things it debars from the privileges of naturalization all who disbelieve in organized government.


Will Caucus on Rate Problem
