BLANCHE BATES VISITS ST. PAUL

Well Known Actress, Barred Out by Theatrical Trust, Stops Over Here

Blanche Bates, one of America's foremost actresses, who has achieved an enviable reputation in the theatrical world, visited St. Paul yesterday for the first time in her life.

Miss Bates and company would have given performances here of the Belasco drama, could they have secured a theater in which to play, but the theatrical syndicate is in control here, and St. Paulites who would witness this artist upon the stage must see her in some other town, if they would behold her at all.

Miss Bates stopped at the Ryan hotel yesterday afternoon, a portion of which she devoted to a sleigh ride about town.

Miss Bates is a California woman, of most engaging personality. When seen at the Ryan late yesterday afternoon about half an hour before her departure for Eau Claire, Miss Bates talked freely of her recent professional engagement in the coast cities.

"The most unique experience I ever encountered in my professional life," said Miss Bates, "happened in Tacoma last Friday night. The new auditorium, which we dedicated that night, was not finished, though it was expected it would be when we were booked. It so happened that none of the chairs for either the main floor or the balconies had arrived. Seats had been sold several days in advance, but when it was found that no chairs existed here for our performances, the management offered to return the money. But no, the people preferred to see the show, even if they had to stand up. And so we gave a performance to a standing audience, for there wasn't a seat in the entire auditorium. Moreover, it was exceedingly cold for Tacoma, and the way the wind whistled and whistled through that theater and across the stage was a caution.

"But we played 'The Darling of the Gods,' which is in five acts, and over two and one-half hours in length, through to the very end, while the audience stood patiently through it all."

After the Chicago engagement, she will go to New York," continued Miss Bates, "for an engagement of three months. On my last Saturday night in Chicago, I produced a new play by Ibsen, which has not yet been presented in English in this country."

Miss Bates has, during the past season, presented Ibsen's "Hedda Gabler" occasionally at matinees, and received high praise for her impersonation of the title role.
