CHAMPIONS TO ROLL

Bowers Will Arrange for Big Event This Month

President Fowler, of the Minnesota State Bowling association, has called a meeting of the board of directors at a Windor hotel, St. Paul, for March 5, at 2:30 p. m.

Arrangements for the coming state tournament the last five days in March are progressing nicely and judging from the interest displayed by the bowlers the coming tournament will be the best of any and one of the smaller towns in the state and one or more teams from each city will be in the tournament.

Curbing Cattle Diseases WASHINGTON, March 1.—President Roosevelt today transmitted to congress a message indorsing measures pending intending to prevent the spread of contagious diseases of animals from one state to another or to foreign countries.

Regulates Shameful Traffic WASHINGTON, March 1.—The senate today ratified a treaty with all nations for prohibiting the sale of white women. All the contracting nations agree to enact laws for the punishment of any person for enticing a woman or girl from one country to another, even with her consent, with a view to her debauchery.

Would Keep Saloons Closed WASHINGTON, March 1.—A resolution of protest against the increase of the house today by Representative Webb of North Carolina deprecating the resolution introduced by Representative Babcock (Wis.) for opening saloons in the district of Columbia, March 5, for the accommodation of inaugural visitors.

Wards Off Cholera WASHINGTON, March 1.—The senate today ratified an international sanitary treaty adopted by a convention of representatives of practically all nations held for the purpose of agreeing upon uniform safeguards for the public health against the invasion and propagation of plague and cholera.

Wheat to Be Studied Thoroughly WASHINGTON, March 1.—An amendment to the agricultural appropriation was adopted in regard to wheat investigation. It appropriates \$25,000 for investigation of all phases of the question to be carried on through the bureau of plant industry and in cooperation with state experiment stations.

Increases Sundry Civil Bill WASHINGTON, March 1.—The sundry civil appropriation bill reported to the senate today carries an increase of \$2,117,470 over the bill as passed in the house. The appropriations aggregate \$67,473,550.

Organize Lacrosse Club A meeting will be held at the Y. M. C. A. Friday evening, March 3, for the purpose of organizing a lacrosse club for the coming season. Great interest is being taken in the game by the members of the Y. M. C. A. and several of the members are said to be very handy with the stick.

St. Thomas Wins Another St. Thomas captured another easy game from the engineer corps Tuesday evening in the Saltus gymnasium by a score of 37 to 4. The contest was simply a walk-over for the Saints, who scored whenever they pleased. The engineer corps could throw only two field baskets for the total of four scores. The first half ended with the score 21 to 2 in the Saints' favor.

SENATE FINALLY GETS MOTION

Passes Three Big Supply Bills and Works at Night on Another

WASHINGTON, March 1.—During the day the senate passed three supply bills aggregating an appropriation of over \$37,000,000 and at night took up a fourth bill carrying over \$67,000,000.

The senate began at 11 a. m. and after a recess lasting from 6 to 8 continued well into the night. The appropriation measures passed were the postoffice bill, \$181,526,842; the pension bill, \$138,000,000, and the river and harbor bill, \$38,550,899.

The principal debate was based on the provision increasing the appropriation for pneumatic tubes in the postoffice bill. The house bill called for \$500,000 and the senate made it \$800,000.

The senate also agreed to conference reports on the military academy and agricultural department bills.

Mr. Bailey introduced a resolution discharging the senate conferees on the statehood bill and receding from the senate amendments. He said that he would call it up tomorrow. The order has the effect of striking out the senate provision for the admission of New Mexico and the house provision for the admission of New Mexico and Arizona.

The terms of the house bill as passed by the senate. If adopted it will provide for the admission of one state consisting of Indian territory and Oklahoma and adopting all the senate amendments in regard to that portion of the bill.

During consideration of the conference report on the military academy bill, Mr. Bailey introduced a resolution of the names of Gen. Hawley and Gen. Osterhaus on the retired list of the army. The Philippines import tariff bill passed.

Busy in the House The house tonight passed the general deficiency appropriation bill, the last of the great supply measures. The amount carried is \$31,224,973.

Find Skeletons of Unionists CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., March 1.—In removing a hill in the eastern part of the city to supply dirt for approaches to a viaduct workmen have discovered in the last two days twenty skeletons, supposed to be the remains of federal soldiers. Brass buttons bearing the insignia of the Union forces were found near the skeletons. It is the general opinion that the remains were those of soldiers killed in the desperate assaults on Missionary Ridge. The indications are that many more skeletons will be removed before the work is finished.
