DARING PROFESSOR ANTAGONIZES STUDENTS

Tells High School Girls "Commencement Trousseau" Are Too Costly

SILOUX CITY, Ia., March 3.—Prof. George Edward Marshall, principal of the high school of this city, caused a riot among the girls of an institution by delivering an address that has won the enthusiastic commendation of parents.

He told the senior class that the custom of wearing complete, elaborate and expensive "commencement trousseaus" prepared in anticipation of graduation was all wrong.

He took up the figures on cost of some of these outfits in past years, having secured them from mothers. He showed that a complete outfit consists of at least four gowns, for class day, reception, dancing and the commencement, each complete from parasol to slippers, and that some of the outfits have cost the parents of the girls as high as \$400.

"This is all wrong," declared Prof. Marshall, "and if there isn't a way to prevent it, there ought to be. If you young women have not the good sense and good taste to agree on the stopping it, then I shall undertake to stop your parents to agree on a limit. You are, by your foolish vanity, making a mockery of the commencement, a faint aristocracy. One simple, inexpensive gown, with some extra shirtings and other necessities, should be worn by all the girls."

Prof. Marshall's movement at once brought the wrath of the young women down on his head. They have threatened a strike and an organized withdrawal from classes unless the principal discontinues interference with what they declare is by no possible construction to be regarded as his business.

The material used is chiffon tulle, and it is made with a full five-gored skirt that has the fullest lace in plaits at the belt and is trimmed with two flounces of the same silk embroidered in self-toned silks and tiny gold paillettes, and heading the flounces are graceful festoons and bows of purple velvet ribbon.

The bodice is quite full and blouses over the wide folded girle of the silk, which is laced together at the back by purple velvet ribbon, and is cut at the neck into a deep V, both front and back.

Bordering the décolletage is a wide flounce of the embroidered silk over which are arranged two bands of the velvet ribbon in such a way as to form a full puff between, and in the middle of full puff between, and in the middle of the front these overlap and finish in loops and ends in the attractive manner illustrated. The sleeves are large, short puffs ending in tight bands with ruffles of the embroidered silk beyond.

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Amendment to the Articles of Incorporation of the Rainy Lake River Boom Corporation

Be It Resolved by the Board of Directors of the Rainy Lake River Boom Corporation, that the Articles of Incorporation of said Corporation be amended and altered as follows:

The undersigned citizens of the State of Minnesota do hereby adopt articles of association and incorporation under and in pursuance of the provisions of Title One (1), Chapter Thirty-four (34) of the General Statutes of the State of Minnesota relating to corporations and of the amendments thereto as follows:

That Article I be amended and altered so as to read as follows:

The name of this corporation shall be the Rainy Lake River Boom Corporation. The general nature of its business shall be the improvement of the Rainy Lake River from its mouth at the Lake of the Woods to the falls of said river at International Falls, otherwise known as Koochiching, in Itasca County, in said State, by cleaning, deepening, straightening the channels of said river, closing sloughs, erecting dikes, booms of all kinds, piers, side-rollers, sluicing floodings and other dams, and otherwise improving said river, and the navigation thereof, and so keeping and maintaining said river and the said improvements and works in such repair as to render driving logs and other timber thereon reasonably practicable and certain; and to purchase, acquire, own, lease, hold, distribute and otherwise handle logs and other timber in said rivers, and in the lakes and tributaries connected therewith, and to collect tolls and charges for such services; and to purchase, acquire, own, lease, hold, occupy, use and dispose of all such land, real estate, rights, easements, privileges, personalty or other property as may be deemed advisable or desirable for any of the purposes aforesaid.

The principal place of transacting the business of said corporation shall be at Boom in the County of Beltrami, State of Minnesota.

We certify that the above resolutions were passed at a regular meeting of the directors of said corporation.
