FARM TEAM DEFEATS THE JUNIOR. A. A. ST. PATRICK CLEARS RIVAL WATER WEAKENS AT MILE AND DUMPS THE TALENT

Patterson's Playing Is Cause for Long and Loud Protest

After wrangling for about three-quarters of an hour over eligible players and referees the basketball game between the A. A. Juniors and the state farm school was finally played. For a while the farm school aggregation threatened to leave the floor unless Patterson was allowed to play. The rules of the league require that players' names should be submitted at least twenty-four hours before the game and the association team held that this had not been done, while the "Aggies" claimed that it had. The question was debated on the floor by the officials, managers, captains and players, and the farm school was finally allowed to play. The game was a succession of fouls, and the game was started. When it ended the farm school had the long end of the 19 to 10 score.

The score of the association team scored the first point of the game by throwing a foul. He increased their lead by another foul, and then proceeded to shoot a basket. During the next two minutes of play two fouls were called on each team, and the game progressed made both while Foster missed, making the score 4 to 2 in favor of the A. A. team. At the end of that time Connolly scored a difficult basket, putting them two in the lead. The farm school then was progressed one by a foul thrown by Greaves. The A. A. team failed to score during the last minute of the game. Patterson twice broke away from his guard and each time shot a basket, making the score at the end of the half 9 to 4 in favor of the "Aggies."

In the second half the A. A. team failed to shoot the basket at all and only succeeded in scoring 4 points on fouls, 2 by MacDonald and 2 by Foster. Patterson shot three more baskets in this half and Greaves 4 baskets and 4 fouls, making the score at the end of the game. The guards, Martinson and Doyle, of the agricultural five, and Fox of the association team, were the main reason for their success each man allowing his forward to shoot but one basket throughout the game. KEEPS WELL UNDER APPROPRIATIONS

Gov. Saries of North Dakota Finishes Paring Down the Bills

MAY RAISE A BILLION MORE BUSHELS OF CORN

Probable Result of Agitation Begun by Iowa Agricultural College

AMES, Ia., March 17.—The authorities of Iowa agricultural college of this place, in a paper published last evening, announced that they were beginning to raise corn, are beginning to wonder what sort of confusion they have kindled. The entire corn producing country of the west has taken up the crusade, with the result that there is serious talk of the possibility of adding 1,000,000,000 bushels to the annual production before two more crops are gathered.

LINEVITCH IS OLD FOE OF KUROPATKIN

ST. PETERSBURG, March 18.—Decided animosity is felt here regarding the fate of the army in Manchuria after its new commander, no news of military developments the last two days having been received. The only announcements yesterday that Gen. Linevitch had assumed command and that Gen. Kurapatkin was departing for St. Petersburg and the Changtufu dispatch filed the morning of March 16 and written at the station of Kaliningrad, a departing Russian general. In this correspondent's opinion no pause in the Japanese advance is probable for some time. The Russians are reported to have been driven to actions and Japanese columns are reported pushing northward as fast as possible to complete the envelopment of the Russian army in Manchuria. However, will have a considerable accession of fresh troops in a day or two, the fourth European corps being now marching and departing southward. Military officials here declare that there are now 250,000 men at Gen. Linevitch's disposal in Manchuria and that his force will be sufficient to cause the Japanese to exercise greater caution in their pursuit.

Drawing Room Chat

ST. PETERSBURG, March 17.—Many stories of interesting occurrences in the drawing rooms of St. Petersburg drawing rooms, where sometimes court news first leaks out. The most important statement is that Emperor William early this week strongly advised Emperor Nicholas to conclude peace and offered his good offices. The Russian emperor is declared to have declined, answering that it was impossible under the present circumstances. According to the story, Mons. Witte, president of the committee of plenipotentiaries at Moscow, was again requested to be relieved as president of the committee of plenipotentiaries. According to another story, M. Panine, the emperor's law minister, is now a real court favorite, is credited with writing the last manifesto. The Panine story is known to be the veriest nonsense and the others probably are only idle gossip.

HONOLULU, March 17.—The British steamer Richmond, bound from London to the orient, has put in here short of coal. Her cargo is supposed to consist of war supplies. The captain of the Richmond says that his destination is Manila, but members of the crew say that the vessel is going to a Japanese navy yard.
