INSURANCE MEN SEE NEW YORK GOVERNOR

He Promises What Help He Can Afford in the Equitable Crisis

ALBANY, N. Y., April 21.—The crisis in the affairs of the Equitable Life insurance society was laid before Gov. Higgins at the executive chamber this afternoon by a committee of thirty-five of the managing agents of the society, which at Syracuse had made the same appeal for mutualization of the society to Supt. Hendricks.

which cast a distinct doubt upon the representations we have made to policy holders and which constitute a menace of the most terrible character to the interests of all who hold contracts with the society.

Mr. Bowes declared that "although the charter requires that each director shall be the proprietor of at least five shares of its stock, we are reliably informed that thirty-eight or forty of the present board of directors are not qualified in law to sit upon the board."

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Move for a Receiver
CHICAGO, April 21.—A bill for the appointment of a receiver for the Equitable and seeking an accounting was filed today in the United States circuit court by Attorney D. J. Schuyler.

The bill asks that the affair be referred to a master in chancery, so that the amount due to each policy holder out of the surplus may be determined for the purpose of distribution.

Attorney Schuyler said that the complainants had held a meeting and decided to take the matter into the federal court. It is the wish, he said, to have a receiver appointed and the affairs of the society ended, so that the policy holders may have a just distribution of the funds and profits now on hand.

In view of the concessions I have been willing to make for the welfare of the society, I am not prepared to take in taken in utter ignorance of the true situation, of which you cannot possibly have accurate knowledge.

I can understand the desire of your body for mutualization, but I do not believe that a system of control which virtually places the agents over the directors and officers is sound in principle.

Means to an End
It was told that these concessions which had been secured, first, because of my loyalty to the society and on the repeated assurances given by the board of directors and to me that they would, if granted, be accepted as a complete settlement, were simply a means to an end, and that the war would go on until I should be forced out of office and the voting power of the stock, which had been, except for a few shares, completely destroyed.

NEW YORK, April 21.—James H. Hyde tonight introduced the following resolution in reply to the committee of agents which waited on him yesterday:

The subject upon which you have addressed me involves the consideration of the whole contract, which has been in progress for several months past. The injurious effect of that contract upon the policy holders is, in that controversy I feel that I have been treated with great injustice, and that no one has so serious a grievance as I have.

As far as any good results could be served by the resignation of any officer, I have no objection, but the society has suffered and is doubtless to suffer in the future, your request is misdirected.

As far as the mutualization of the company is concerned, I have already expressed my views clearly. I am not sure, however, that you can secure the relief desired by legislation. The question as to whether there are dummy directors to be determined by the courts.

I will assure you that whether legislation is feasible or not, I'm neither in favor of mutualization. When we get through with the examination of the insurance department will disclose absolute truth. I should not approve the amended charter for the reason that he believes that the value of his own stock would be endangered by such approval.

The first proposition, you know, I refused to accept. The second one, which is now an order of the day, I am very much disposed to accept. It provides that the policy holders elect 28 of the 52 directors. I believe that under the circumstances it will be only a question of time when the policy holders would be in full control of the society.

After the conference the agents generally expressed satisfaction at their conference with Mr. Hendricks and at his statement.

FIX UP FRIARS' LAND Differences Will Be Submitted to Arbitration
WASHINGTON, April 21.—Secretary Taft and Senator Guitierrez, the latter representing the Philippine Sugar Estates Development company, today reached an agreement to arbitrate the outstanding issue respecting the sale to the Philippine government of the Dominican friars' land, amounting to 16,000 acres, valued at about \$2,500,000, which amount has been on deposit in New York for more than a year awaiting an agreement between the principals. Title to eight haciendas is involved. As to five of these there has been little controversy, but the Dominican title to the remaining three is pronounced insufficient by the Philippines council.

LA CROSSE, Wis., April 21.—John D. Young, one of the best known lumbermen in the northwest, is dead of pneumonia, aged 50 years. Mr. Young was born in Homesville, Ind., and has been connected with the lumber industry in this city for thirty years, also operating a large mill at Duluth, Minn., and a line of retail lumber yards throughout Minnesota.

DEATHS OF THE DAY
PEKIN, April 21.—Paul Lessar, Russian minister to China, whose foot was recently amputated, is dead. M. Lessar, who was councillor of the Russian embassy in London, was appointed minister to China July 12, 1901. He distinguished himself as the negotiator with the Chinese of the proposed amendments to the Russo-Chinese Manchuria treaty. Early in 1901 he began a series of meetings with Prince Ching and Wang Wen Shao, who urged strong modifications of the old agreement, made with the late Li Hung Chang, in order to maintain the sovereignty of China over Manchuria. Russia, through M. Lessar, agreed to some of the Chinese demands, but the war with Japan ended the diplomatic negotiations on the subject. M. Pavloff, formerly Russian minister to Korea and now at Shanghai, will probably succeed M. Lessar here.

LONDON, April 21.—The earl of Chichester (Rev. Francis Godwin Pilham) is dead. He was born Oct. 8, 1844.
