ORDER OF PUBLICATION.

In the Circuit Court of Jasper County, Missouri, in vacation, April 14, 1903 Austin L. Nutt, Plaintiff, vs. vs B. B. Hubbard and J. F. Harrison, Defendants.

Now at this day comes the Plaintiff in the above entitled cause, by Attorneys E. O. Brown and G. W. Crowder, before the undersigned Clerk of the circuit Court of Jasper County, Missouri, in vacation, and files his petition and affidavit, stating among other things that the defendant B. B. Hubbard is a non-resident of the state of Missouri, and can not be served with the ordinary process of law. It is therefore ordered by said Clerk, in vacation, that publication be made, notifying the said Defendant that suit has been commenced against him in the Circuit Court of Jasper County, Missouri, at Carthage, Mo. the object and general nature of which is to obtain a decree of the court adjudging and decreeing that the Defendant acknowledge satisfaction on the margin of the record of a certain Deed of Trust, executed by Joseph L. Largent on the 7th day of February 1880 whereby he conveyed to one J. F. Harrison the following described real estate situate in Jasper County, Missouri to-wit: The South East One Fourth (1/4) of the North West One Fourth (1/4) of section Twenty-five (25) Township Thirty (30) Range Thirty (30) in trust to secure the payment of Two hundred Dollars (\$200) each due and payable in nine (9) and fifteen (15) months from the date thereof respectively, with interest at the rate of six (6) per cent, per annum which said notes were payable to the order of Defendant B. B. Hubbard said Deed of Trust was recorded on the 3rd of March 1880 in Record "B" at page 40 of the Records of Jasper County; that said Deed of Trust be adjudged satisfied and cancelled and for naught held and esteemed, and that the cloud upon Plaintiff's title to said premises occasioned thereby be removed and for general relief, and that unless said Defendant do and appear at the next term of the said Court, to commence and be holden at Carthage, in said County, on the First Monday in June, 1903, and answer or demur to the Plaintiff's petition or before the third day of said term, if the term shall so long continue, and if not, then before the end of the term, the same will be taken as confessed.

It is further ordered that a copy hereof be published, at least once a week for four weeks successively the last insertion to be at least fifteen days before the first day of said term in the "Jasper News" a newspaper published in said county and designated by the Plaintiff, with the approval of the Clerk as most likely to give notice to said Defendant. 


