TOOK A GOLD MEDAL.

T. W. ELLIS' GOOD SHOWING AT THE POULTRY SHOW.

Took Highest Honors In Mediterranean Class And Captured Several Ribbons And A Cash Prize.

T. W. Ellis the well known farmer living northwest of this city took several years of the poultry to the Beauty Show at Chicago last week and when he returned he took the appearance of a country man who had been decorated by a crowd of foreign people. Dressed in the livery of his country he was a real sight and every passer-by was curious. Two gold medals and several ribbons were captured. He took a gold medal for his Mediterranean class and a cash prize of \$2.00.

His final exhibition was made up of Single Comb, Game, Leghorns and Bantam breeds. His exhibition first, second and third prizes in each class. First, second, third, fourth and fifth prizes in Bantam classes and several prizes in game. The checks for first prize for drake and first prize for hen. Displaying his four grand classes—Asiatic, Mediterranean, American and Bantam, so as to make even competition in weight, except prize were awarded in each class. Gold medals suitably inscribed, were the tokens of winning in these classes, a medal being provided for the best male, hen, cock and pair in each class—10 medals altogether. Mr. Ellis secured the gold medal for the best cock in the Mediterranean class. As this was the best time Mr. Ellis has played his poultry in competition for prizes he naturally feels pretty good over his success. Especially in view of the large number and high class competition.

H. O. Baker, of this city, took a Rhode Island Red Cockerel down Friday merely to have it scored by the poultry show judges, which, if it had been entered earlier in the week for a prize would have captured the medal in the Asiatic class as it scored 61 which was higher than that scored by the winner of that class.

The poultry show was a great success in every particular and the promoters are already making plans for a still greater show next year. The receipts at the door more than met expenses and all receipts over expenses will be prorated among the exhibitors to help meet the
