Shelby County Mo. is a county to be proud of. It has had no saloons or pool rooms for 18 yrs. The result is it has no representative in the penitentiary no boys in the reform school, no girls in the industrial school. The county jail is empty and the circuit court in session only five days a year.

Just look at the difference in Jasper Co., with its 72 saloons. The jail isn't large enough after a number is sent to the penitentiary and reform schools. The courts are busy. Whiskey at the bottom of nearly all of it.

Consider the expense of the Brice murderers alone to the county. Their trials and railroad expenses and then their guard going to Joplin and imbibing so much personal liberty that they followed his example and the whole county was aroused with fear of the escaped convicts. Consider the expense of searching for them. Telephone, telegraph, and photographs, messages and rewards offered and persons going here and there, railroad fare, car fare buggy hire etc etc. Convicts have escaped before from our county jail.

I should think by this time Jasper County has had enough object lessons to want to close up every saloon in her county. Instead of living on the tainted money received by a license system live on the rich minerals God has placed beneath her surface and the rich products from the farming land. And if by industry and thrift the strong men of Jasper County can't keep up the road fund without the saloon license let us travel through the mud.
