Prof. J. Lorenzo Zwickey the fourth attraction in the Lecture course, gave one of his illustrated art lectures at the opera house Thursday night to a good size audience. Mr. Zwickey began his lecture with a discussion as to the important part Art plays in our lives. He spoke of the real enjoyment that comes to the one whose mental, moral and spiritual natures and the capacity for seeing the beautiful are fully developed, compared to the one whose one aim is to the accumulation of wealth. The speaker dwelt at length on the lack of aesthetic taste among the people in many ways. For instance in the custom of the ladies of wearing so much fruit, vegetables and shrunken on their hats. These things are all right in the garden and orchard, but they are entirely out of place on the heads of the ladies.

Mr. Zwickey is a rapid fire talker and worked his pictures with the same enthusiasm. The artist's pictures which he drew as he talked were wonderful. From his seemingly magic touch the white paper quickly developed into landscape, a scene in Venice, a street in New York or the old farm house in the clutches of winter. While he drew the big buildings in the great city he recounted the amusing adventures of "Uncle Josh" and while he drew the old country home he recited a poem to correspond. The lecture as a whole was full of wit, humor and pathos and doubtless had the effect of placing a larger meaning to the realm of the beautiful in the hearts of the hearers.

JASPER BOY IN CINCINNATI

Curtis Ree Writes Of The Ohio Metropolis.

Curtis Ree, a well known Jasper boy who is now in Cincinnati, taking a course of telegraphy writes his father an interesting letter in which among other things he says:

"I have been getting along fine with my work. I have been going to school every day and three nights out of each week. I like Telegraphy fine and it isn't as hard as I expected to find it. I can receive about eight words per minute and I have been in school two weeks today. I get an hour each day practicing on the type writer and am getting along fine on that. I expect to be here about 4 months. Well I think if you was up here you wouldn't sow many oats. It snowed all day Monday and is sleeting tonight and it has been pretty cold.

Cincinnati certainly is a fine place although it is awful rough in some parts. They have some fine parks here Mr Riddle that is my room mate and I went out to the Zoo park Saturday evening as there is no school on Saturday afternoons and it is a fine place. It is about five miles out there and it cost 5 cents to go out on a car. They have all kinds of animals that you can think of and some that you wouldn't think of. I saw a snake out there that maby you think he wasn't a buster. This is the only trip we have taken since I have been here. We are going to take a boat and go to Conv Island as soon as it gets warm enough.

There are 4 of us rooming together. Mr Riddle, Mr Stone and Mr Galway, and they are all fine fellows and Stone and Galway are both operators. Galway, is holding an office out here about 2 1/2 miles. He is night operator. He got out of school about 2 months ago and Mr Stone has just got out of school. Mr Riddle started into school the same morning that I did. We have an in-

strument here in our room that we practice on at nights.

I was up to the Baptist Church Sunday morning. They have a fine church here. It seats 1500 people and they have a fine pipe organ. Mr Galway is a member of it. He is from Tennessee near Bristol and Mr Riddle is from West Virginia and Stone is from South Carolina.
