### JASPER LEADS AT FAIR.

#### MANY JASPERITES EXHIBIT AND ALL OF THEM WIN PRIZES.

Easily Captured More First Premiums Than Any Other Town Of Her Size

Jasper was well represented at the Kuel Fair last week and as usual took more than her share of the ribbons. Nearly every department of the fair was represented by exhibits from our little city and the immediate neighborhood around, there being poultry, hogs, horses, cattle, sheep and farm products. Among the exhibitors together with the prizes won were the following:

F W Rumble exhibited eight head of Lincolnshire sheep which won nine first premiums and two second premiums among which were three sweepstakes

Mr C E Wright took first prize on his yearling draft colt.

Mr J S Rose took two first on one sucking colt, two seconds on another and also first on his yearling stallion.

Mr Vincent took first on the stallion belonging to the Jasper Coach Horse Association.

O Thompson took first premium on his standard bred mare; first on carriage team; first on single driver; first on his standard bred yearling colt; second on best family mare. His premiums total about thirty-five dollars. Mr Thompson also took second money in a 2:35 trot.

### VERDICT FOR THE HUSBAND.

Jury Decides His Wife's Affections Were Worth \$15,000.

Lamar, Mo.—The Fuller-Robinson alienation suit was decided in the circuit court here Tuesday. The jury was out about an hour and returned a verdict for the plaintiff for \$15,000. Roy Fuller sued Budd M. Robinson for \$25,000 for alienating his wife's affections. The participants are all prominent in the social circles of Joplin.

The defendant, Robinson, a wealthy mine owner of Joplin, and the plaintiff was formerly employed by him as book-keeper. They were warm friends until Robinson became attached to Mrs Fuller, when she and her husband separated and the husband brought suit against Robinson. Mrs. Fuller filed suit for divorce from husband, alleging he had slandered her in bringing the suit. She admitted all the allegations her husband had made in his petition, so the divorce was refused. Mrs. Robinson and her children now reside in Kansas City.
