GENERAL REPUBLICAN VICTORY

Taft and Sherman Swept Country at Tuesday's Election.

Most Doubtful States Are in Republican Column.—Missouri and Maryland Yet in Doubt.

Hadley's Election Assured.—Both Sides Claim State Officers.—Vote Still Incomplete.

Morgan upsets Democrat Majority in 15th Dist. and Defeats Hackney for Congress.

Kansas Goes Republican—Nebraska for Bryan for First Time.—New York City the Surprise of the Day.

Entire Republican Ticket Elected in Jasper County, Except One Legislator.

Sufficient returns were at hand Tuesday night to indicate Taft's election, and by early Wednesday morning the probability strengthened into certainty, as it was definitely learned that Bryan had lost New York, Indiana and Ohio.

Taft's plurality in New York reached the 175,000 mark, this unlooked-for vote being made possible by the fact that New York City upset all "dope" and precedent by going Republican. Gov. Hughes ran far behind the national ticket, but still has 50,000 votes to spare over Chanler.

Latest returns indicate Hadley election to the governorship, by a plurality of from 7,000 to 25,000 and also seem to give the state electoral vote to Taft. Both parties still claim the state legislature, and figures show the Democrats ahead, with many precincts yet to hear from. Hadley's election, however, is conceded by all. The precincts still out may change the situation greatly.

The Republican senatorial nomination is still in doubt, McKinley and Kerns leading all others.

Wm. Joel Stone received the Democratic nomination for senator, defeating Folk by a heavy vote. In Jasper county Stone's plurality was close to the 2,000 mark.

Chas. H. Morgan, Republican candi-

date for congressman from the 15th district, defeated Thos. Hackney by an approximate plurality of 700 votes. Hackney lost ground in almost every county.

Kansas is Republican by 25,000 and Stubbs was chosen governor by a slightly smaller vote.

Bryan carried Nebraska, the first time his home state has accorded him her electoral vote.

Illinois is heavily Republican, as was expected. Speaker Cannon was returned to congress by 8000 plurality.

In Jasper county the Republican ticket was elected in its entirety, except for Elliott in the second legislature district, who was beaten by Abernathy by 8 votes. The majorities for the Republican ticket range from 200 or 300 as high as 1200, to judge from the still incomplete returns. Morgan's plurality over Hackney in the county is about 1500, and Hadley's plurality over Cowherd will reach nearly that figure.

Jasper precinct gave Taft 139 to Bryan's 127, and on most of the county offices the vote was practically the same. Hadley got 146 to Cowherd's 121. Morgan received 138 to Hackney's 129. Tom Brook led his ticket with 150 votes to Wright's 116, and Parker was next with 137 to McDonald's 132. On the other offices there was little or no scratching.
