To Get Rid of Mites.

To rid the poultry house of mites get ten cents worth of carbolic acid, make a strong, hot soap suds, put half the acid in the sprinkling pot, pour in the hot suds and thoroughly sprinkle, throwing the solution high up on the walls. Do this in the morning and shut the fowls out during the day. Two days later clean out the house and use the rest of the acid in the same way. In this way, says the Farm and Ranch, in three days the number of mites may be reduced from 10,000,000 or any other number, to 0.
