

School Bonds Diminishing.

The Jasper school bonds are being paid off with a degree of frequent regularity that ought to be pleasing to the taxpayers. At the last meeting of the board \$200,000 was paid, making a total of \$1,000,000 paid since January 1, 1912. This leaves the small balance of \$140,000 unpaid.
